Mayor's Message

Having our first snow storm in February is a bit unusual. However, once again congratulations to the Public Works Department as they continue to do a fine job clearing the roads. The cold weather should keep the snow on the dam for a while and the children can enjoy sledding. Please beware—the snow on the lake slows the freezing process making it unsafe.

The Library Committee continues to meet and have visited several new libraries gathering ideas which may be incorporated in their plan. I know they plan to visit the Fanwood Library as that is a community of a similar size. I am confident the committee will have a plan this year.

The committee reviewing the Ness property is moving toward the first-phase plan to define the wetland area in order to submit our request for a one million dollar open space grant from Somerset County.

Regarding Best Lake, I had hoped we would be into construction by now, however we do have final plans and work on reconstruction of the dam and dredging will begin this spring. A conceptual plan is in Borough Hall for your viewing. I am pleased the style fits the site and the area.

Spratford Park is complete and we are planning a dedication ceremony on the 14th of April. Carol Spratford and her family will be able to be there. I am looking forward to it and hope to see many of you in attendance to honor Elmer.

Councilman Bill Nehls is planning another Emergency Services Pancake Breakfast in April. Final details will be posted on our website and channel 22.

We have received word that NJDOT will begin the second stage of the Route I-78 reconstruction project and work is scheduled to begin on or about March 9, 2007. The work will be ongoing (weather permitting) to November, 2007. A major change will be eastbound access to the Garden State Parkway will be from the local lanes only. Errant Vehicles will be directed to utilize the U-turn at Exit 54. There will be advance warning signs with directions.

The Department of Public Works will again have a Spring Cleanup. Use biodegradable paper bags for all lawn debris and secure small branches and twigs in manageable bundles at your curbside. Trash or refuse will not be picked up and only small branches arranged in manageable bundles will be accepted. Your own contractor should remove large limbs/trees, which have fallen outside of the Borough's Right-Of-Way. Remember, raking of leaves and debris into the gutter is strictly prohibited by ordinance and may result in the issuance of a summons.

TREES & OUR ENVIRONMENT

The roots of trees help keep streams and rivers clean by preventing soil erosion. Soil washed away by stormwater and deposited in waterways causes a buildup of sediment that can harm aquatic organisms and make rivers, lakes and harbors more susceptible to flooding.

Trees are among the hardest working natural resources in our community. They enhance our quality of life with their beauty and provide habitat for birds and other creatures. But trees also contribute a significant amount of the oxygen in the earth's atmosphere and they play a major role in keeping the environment clean.

Drinking water supplies also benefit from trees. Their leafy crowns break the impact of falling rain so that more water has time to evaporate or drip gradually onto the soil, replenishing groundwater supplies, instead of racing to the nearest storm sewer.

"Trees also scrub ozone, sulfur dioxide and other pollutants from the air we breathe and in some areas where landfills or manufacturing activities have polluted the ground or surrounding wetlands, cleanup projects sometimes call for planting certain types of trees that help absorb the toxins through a process called phytoremediation."

Trees fight global warming

With growing concerns about climate change, Watchung residents have a simple way to fight global warming in their own back yards just by planting and protecting trees. Large trees on the south, east and west sides of a house can reduce energy use for air conditioning, cutting summer electricity usage by 5 to 10 percent. In the winter, deciduous trees drop their leaves so that the sun's rays help warm the house, reducing heating fuel consumption. As a result, trees help reduce a household's carbon footprint all year long.

"In Watchung we appreciate our trees and we have a long tradition of protecting them," said Mayor Ellis. "The municipality will release an ordinance this year that discourages unnecessary tree removal and will require replacement, especially those that are damaged or destroyed during construction.

PROTECT YOUR CHILDREN LEAD POISONING

Lead Poisoning is the #1 environmental health issue affecting children under six.

If your home was built before 1978, your children could be at risk. Each year, nearly 5,000 New Jersey children are diagnosed with dangerous levels of lead in their blood. This statewide problem affects urban, suburban and rural households.

Financial assistance is available to help residential property owners remediate lead-based paint hazards. Families with a lead poisoned child may be eligible to receive assistance to relocate to lead-safe housing.

Cat Licenses

Cat licenses are due during the month of May. **The most efficient method is to mail your license request to Borough Hall.** Simply enclose a copy of the updated rabies certificate (**the State Board of Health requires that the vaccination against rabies be valid through April of licensing year**) with your check for payment, and a stamped, self-addressed envelope. **Using this method will alleviate the inconvenience of waiting at Borough Hall.** Licenses can also be purchased in person Monday through Friday from 8:00 AM to 4:00 PM.

All original documentation will be mailed to you with the license and tag. A license cannot be issued without proof of a current vaccination. All cats seven months of age or older must be licensed. If you have more than one cat to register, please provide requested information for each cat. You may use a separate sheet of paper or pick up additional registration forms at Borough Hall. Proof of vaccination must be submitted with this form for each animal registered. Please use this form to mail your request to the Board of Health, 15 Mountain Blvd., Watchung, NJ 07069.

YOUR LOCAL HEALTH DEPARTMENT WHAT WE DO FOR YOU

The title notwithstanding, it is impossible to describe in a brief article all the services your local health department provides, but it is extremely important that you and all we serve understand how we serve you. The residents of the State of New Jersey may be called upon to determine the source, and thus the extent, of the public health services they receive. If this comes to pass, the public will have to make an informed decision and your local health department is here to help you make that decision.

Your municipality receives public health services from the Middle-Brook Regional Health Commission, of which it is a full member. The Middle-Brook Regional Health Commission is a full service public health department providing services dictated by national standards, State health and environmental laws, and the needs of the communities we serve.

Due to the consolidate nature of the Commission, your municipality shares public health services with five other towns. This allows the costs of these services to be reduced, but at the same time provides for local response and services. The Commission and its staff are involved in your town thus enabling us to understand your needs, get to know you and the community, and provide quality local services at a reduced price with no loss of services. Our proximity and knowledge of the community is particularly important in these times requiring emergency preparedness activities.

The Middle-Brook Regional Health Commission provides a complete array of public health and environmental health services. Just a few of these services are: health screenings and clinics, such as blood pressure checks, well-baby clinics, and flu clinics; emergency response, preparedness, and planning; environmental health activities such as wells, safe drinking water, septic systems, and indoor air issues; participation in local health activities such as municipal drug and alcohol committees, team response with local police, fire, EMS, and emergency management; working with numerous local partners to provide the best public health services possible. We also provide health education and information sessions, inspect all the local restaurants and schools, respond to local complaints, and investigate cases of communicable disease in the community. Our activities are endless.

We are your local health department and we plan on being here for you for many years to come. If we can provide you with any assistance or information ,please do not hesitate to contact us. We are here to prevent disease, promote the well-being of our citizens, and protect your health. Let us help you become healthy, and by so doing we will make our community healthy. WATCHUNG FIRE DEPARTMENT



During 2006, the Watchung Volunteer Fire Department responded to 284 calls, held 25 training drills and attended 5 mutual aid training sessions totaling over 2600 man hours.

Please help us find you in case of an emergency. House numbers should be clearly visible to all emergency services. Numbers should be a minimum of 3" and reflective. It is recommended that these markings be on a mailbox or a lawn marker at the street. Valuable time can be lost trying to determine the correct address for our response.

Remember Daylight Savings Time starts earlier than usual this year. On March 10th, when you change your clocks, change your smoke and carbon monoxide detector batteries. Test your detectors at least once a month. As a family, prepare an evacuation plan with 2 ways out of each room and a meeting place outside your home. Practice your plan so you are prepared in case of an emergency.

Are you planning major renovations or rebuilding your house or business? You can help the fire department by allowing us to train at the structure prior to demolition. We can perform search, rescue, ventilation, ladders, hose line advancement and other valuable training in a real setting. Information is available at the Construction office at the time you apply for the demolition permit. During 2006, we were given permission to train at O'Conner's multiple times, as well as a few homes in town. Please help us in our training efforts so we can better serve the community.

Are you planning to sell your home? If so, there is a new law in effect that requires the seller to have a minimum of one 5 to 10 pound ABC dry chemical fire extinguisher mounted and visible in the kitchen area of the residence. As a reminder, you must also have smoke and carbon monoxide detectors mounted, operating and inspected prior to the sale. For assistance on the number and location of these required items, please contact the Bureau of Fire Prevention at (908) 756-0080.

Do you have a hydrant on or near your property? During spring and summer, they can become hard to find when grass and plants start to grow. You can help us by keeping these hydrants clear and visible to us. Cut back new growth in the warm weather. Being able to quickly find a hydrant can save us precious time in an emergency. Please adopt a hydrant and help out!

The Watchung Volunteer Fire Department is always in need of new members. Any person, 16 years of age or older with a desire to serve their community, can join. We have many responsibilities to perform from firefighters to drivers and pump operators. Training is provided at no cost to you. 
