21	meeting the applicant finished the presentation and
22	then rested their case.
23	As you remember from our last special
24	meeting, we had stated that they had listened to our
2 E	gommonts and gongorns and had rowiged their plans

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And they had submitted a new set that reflected those comments, changes and additions.

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As you also remember at our special meeting of August 10th, the opposer, Weldon, was to present his witness, Mr. Simoff, to present their traffic report. And Mr. Simoff had contracted the COVID virus and was unable to be present. It was the opinion of this board to continue this application until tonight's meeting.

But before we get any further, Mr.

Simoff, how are you doing?

12 HAL SIMOFF: I'm doing fine. Thank
13 you for your concern.

CHAIRPERSON SCHAEFER: Well, it's good to see you. Glad you're here.

Okay. So now we're going --

HAL SIMOFF: I just want to add that I had the vaccine so that my -- my virus traits were minimal. So that was a positive.

Thank you.

CHAIRPERSON SCHAEFER: That's good.

I am going to be proceeding with the opposer, Weldon, who is represented by their attorney, Mr. Butler. But before we do, I'm turning it over to Frank because I know Frank wants to

1 address the board.

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ATTORNEY LINNUS: Yes. Thank you,
Madam Chair. We're at the portion of the public
hearing where the applicant has rested. And now the
objector is coming in with some testimony and it's
the objector's portion of the case. He has Mr.
Simoff here tonight, his traffic consultant.

Just to refresh the board as to where we are and where we're going with traffic, the applicant has proposed, along with this site plan, an installation of a traffic signal at the intersection of Bonnie Burn Road and the site entrance road. So that is before the board.

That issue is totally within the jurisdiction of the Union County Planning Board. We don't have jurisdiction over whether they're going to get a traffic signal at that location or not. However, we must proceed on the site plan aspects of this application, which does include, and assumes, a traffic signal.

If for some reason, the board approves this with the traffic signal and Union County does not authorize a traffic signal then the applicant must return to this board with a new plan -- a new site plan not showing a traffic signal because we

have no jurisdiction over that issue.

We maintain our rights, planning board rights to review the site plan in its entirety, including all aspects of traffic, which include access, circulation, traffic impact and potential off-tract improvements.

So having said that, I think the applicant -- the objector, can proceed with its witness. Unless the board has any questions.

CHAIRPERSON SCHAEFER: Before we proceed with Mr. Butler, just an FYI to anyone who is here from the public, you will be able to ask questions and questions only of the opposer's witness, Mr. Simoff, that has to do with traffic.

No comments will be made on this application until the application is completely done. And then you will be able to make comments at the very end of the application when both sides have rested.

So with that being said, I have also been informed that Mayor Balla is somewhere here. He just called in. So he's on the phone.

MAYOR BALLA: Yeah, I'm here.

CHAIRPERSON SCHAEFER: Okay.

All right, Mr. Butler, would you like

- 10 from the -- from the east to make a left onto the

- 12 A. Right. It's basically in the middle,
- 13 in between the east and west lanes.
- 14 O. Okay. Before I leave this exhibit, is
- 15 there any other comments you want to make on it?
- 16 A. No, I think I would like to get into
- 17 | the issues of the traffic control.
- 18 Q. Okay. We have the report. Do you have
- 19 the plan here? We can always go back to it.
- 20 CHAIRPERSON SCHAEFER: Mr. Butler, do
- 21 | you want the screen removed?
- 22 | THE WITNESS: Please.
- 23 ATTORNEY BUTLER: Yes, please. I'm
- 24 sorry, Madam Chair.
- 25 Yes, I am through with that exhibit for

- now unless we have to call for it to be back and I don't think we will have to.
- Thank you very much for reminding me.
- 4 CHAIRPERSON SCHAEFER: No problem.
- 5 ATTORNEY BUTLER: Okay. Now, if
- 6 Theresa Snyder would be kind enough to put up on the
- 7 | screen OW-1, which is a traffic report of Hal
- 8 | Simoff, dated July 29th, 2021. OW-1.
- 9 BOARD SECRETARY: Is this correct?
- 10 THE WITNESS: Yeah.
- 11 ATTORNEY BUTLER: Yes, that's the
- 12 | second -- but that's fine. That's fine. I'm going
- 13 | to ask some preliminary questions.
- 14 That's perfect. Thank you very much.
- 15 BY ATTORNEY BUTLER:
- Q. Now, Mr. Simoff, you're objecting on
- 17 behalf of Weldon Quarry; are you not?
- 18 A. Yes.
- 19 O. Okay. Weldon Quarry is located
- 20 directly across the street from the subject
- 21 | property; is that correct?
- 22 A. Correct.
- Q. Okay. Now, have you had conversations
- 24 | with Bob Weldon, the president of Weldon Materials,
- 25 Inc., regarding traffic to and from the quarry using

Bonnie	Burn	Road?

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- A. Yes.
- Q. Okay. Can you give us the benefit of what you learned from those discussions and those meetings?
- A. A significant proportion of the Weldon trucking, as well as the visitors, the trucks and activity that come and go to the quarry, use Bonnie Burn Road as a -- as an access route from Route 78 and from Valley Road to get to the entrance to the quarry that is down on New Providence Road.
- Q. Okay. Now, the entrance and exit to the quarry is located on New Providence Road; is that correct?
 - A. Yes.
- Q. Okay. Now you have been out there and you watched traffic movements from the quarry in and out?
- A. Many times.
- Q. Many times? Okay.
 - In your opinion, on New Providence Road is it difficult to make a left-hand turn?
 - A. Yes. A left-hand turn out.
- Q. And that's because of?
 - A. The backup from -- the backup from the

- 1 intersection of New Providence and Bonnie Burn
- 2 during the peak hours. It's basically a
- 3 | heavily-traveled intersection, Bonnie Burn and New
- 4 Providence Road.
- 5 Q. Okay. Now, let me talk to you about
- 6 Union Avenue Place. That's also across the street
- 7 | from the exit of the quarry; is it not?
- 8 A. Yes.
- 9 O. Was there an issue associated with
- 10 that?
- 11 A. Well, there's a truck limit, a weight
- 12 limit on Union Avenue so that all the traffic
- 13 exiting the quarry has to either turn left or right,
- 14 all the truck traffic.
- 15 Q. If it makes a left. You just described
- 16 | how difficult it is to make a left; did you not?
- 17 A. Right. So most of the traffic makes a
- 18 | right and heads towards -- heads towards Bonnie Burn
- 19 Road.
- 20 Q. Okay. Now, when it reaches Bonnie Burn
- 21 | Road that's a signaled intersection; is it not?
- 22 A. Yes, it is.
- Q. And Weldon traffic can, at that point,
- 24 can make a right and go west towards 78; is that
- 25 correct?

- - Q. And it could also make a left -- it could also make a left on Route 22; could it not?
 - A. Yes.

Yes.

Α.

- Q. It could also go through the intersection and drive over the flyover into the center of Scotch Plains; is that correct?
 - A. Correct, Park Avenue.
- Q. Okay. Now, you indicated that Bob Weldon advised you that these are the travel ways of his trucks and the trucks that he hires; is that correct?
- A. And patrons of the quarry, you know, contractors that are coming to the quarry to pick up material.
- Q. Okay. Now, forget about the quarry and the traffic from the quarry. Bonnie Burn Road, how would you describe the driving general public, as far as number of vehicles on Bonnie Burn Road?
- A. Well, most of the -- in the morning the traffic is predominantly headed westbound going towards 78. And then there's a reverse flow in the afternoon where most of the traffic is headed eastbound coming from 78, coming down the hill.
 - Q. Okay. Now those -- you even have

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- figures, do you not, specifically explaining what you just said on Page 2 of your report, OW-1?
- A. Yes. Down near the bottom.

4 ATTORNEY LINNUS: Excuse me, Mr.

5 | Simoff, Mr. Butler. What is the date of this OW-1?

ATTORNEY BUTLER: OW-1 is dated July

29th, 2021.

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8 ATTORNEY LINNUS: Thank you.

9 ATTORNEY BUTLER: And, Mr. Linnus,

10 tomorrow I will be sending you, like you know has

11 been my habit, all the exhibits and the numbers for

12 all the exhibits to assist everybody in evaluating

13 | this case. That will go out tomorrow.

14 ATTORNEY LINNUS: Thank you.

15 BY ATTORNEY BUTLER:

- Q. Now, before we go into what you have on
- 17 Page 1, your report, as well as the Bowman Report,
- 18 which was authored by Eric Keller, refers to a.m.
- 19 | peak hour and p.m. peak hour; does it not?
- 20 A. Yes.
- 21 Q. Okay. I want to get an understanding
- 22 of peak hour because not everybody is a traffic
- 23 engineer and not everybody understands the meaning
- 24 of those terms.

Now just stick with a.m. As best you

- can and as simply as you can, would you explain what you mean in your reports when you use the term "a.m.
- 3 peak hour"?
- A. Yes. The practice is usually where
- 5 | we -- traffic counts are conducted in 15-minute
- 6 periods. In the a.m. it's usually 7:00 to 9:00 a.m.
- 7 and then what happens is the four contiguous
- 8 | 15-minute count periods that turn out to be the
- 9 highest four numbers combined, is characterized as
- 10 | the peak hour.
- 11 Q. So those 15-minute segments, they would
- 12 be continuous; would they not?
- 13 A. Yes.
- 14 Q. They're not interrupted?
- 15 A. Right. They would have to be
- 16 | contiguous to establish the peak hour.
- 17 Q. So in any particular site between
- 18 7:00 a.m. and 9:00 a.m. we could have a different
- 19 specific hour as the peak a.m. hour; is that
- 20 | correct?
- 21 A. Yes.
- Q. And does it work the same way for p.m.
- 23 | peak hour?
- A. Correct, yes.
- Q. Okay. Now let's go to Page 2 of OW-1.

- And you have peak hour trip generation, 230 units; 1 do you not?
- 3 Α. Yes.

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- Where did you get those numbers? Ο.
- 5 Α. There is a Table 2 in the Bowman Report that calculates the peak hour based on the 6 7 Institute of Transportation Engineers' criteria for calculating peak hour. 8
- Ο. Okay. Now, that Bowman Report dated 10 5/1, revised 10/7/19, its original date is 5/1/19, 11 revised 10/7/19; is that the report you're referring 12 to?
 - Α. Yes, it's entitled "Traffic Engineering Evaluation."
 - Okay. And that was submitted to this planning board in support of this application; is that correct?
 - Α. Yes.
- 19 Was there any other traffic report that 20 either Mr. Keller or Bowman Engineering submitted in 21 support of this application?
 - Α. I don't believe so.
- 23 0. Okay.
- 2.4 ATTORNEY DORY: Objection. Objection,
- 2.5 just for the record. I just want to note my

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- objection. The applicant submitted various traffic reports.
- 3 ATTORNEY BUTLER: Do you want to 4 identify them?
- 5 CHAIRPERSON SCHAEFER: Ms. Dory,
- 6 before you begin, I don't know who has -- who's not
- 7 | muted but everybody needs to be muted. We're
- 8 getting some feedback here, a banging, and it's very
- 9 distracting. I'm sorry to interrupt.
- 10 | ATTORNEY BUTLER: I'm sorry if I'm
- 11 | causing it. I'm sorry if I'm causing it, Madam

 - Q. Okay. Now, this is trip generation, this means these are the increased vehicles that are going to be created by the 230-unit apartments; is that correct?
 - A. Yes. It's the -- it's the accepted means of projecting that.
 - Q. All right. You're not challenging those figures, are you?
 - A. No.
 - Q. Now, let's go down further and talk about actual traffic on Bonnie Burn Road, and I think those numbers, a.m. peak and p.m. peak, reflect what I just said; is that correct?
 - A. Yes, they reflect the projected numbers. There's a growth volume. There's a volume associated with additional -- with additional nearby approved developments. And these are the numbers that Bowman developed for the east and westbound on Bonnie Burn Road.
 - Q. Okay. Now, these are numbers that

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- Bowman represented that he counted or had somebody else count?
 - A. There were counts and then there were projections for additional traffic.
 - Q. Okay. And you, for your report, have adopted those numbers; is that correct?
 - A. Yes.
 - Q. Without doing independent vehicle inspections, you relied upon the Bowman traffic counts; is that correct?

- Q. Projections, okay. The a.m. peak hour is how many vehicles westbound?

- A. Well, this is what happens, as we stated, the peak hour is approximately between 7:15 and 8:15. And then as these numbers increase, this queuing will increase.
- Q. Okay. Now, let me go, if I may, to OW-5, which is your supplemental report, dated September 1, 2021; is it not?

ATTORNEY BUTLER: Now, Theresa, would you please put up K, which is Page 13 of 18 of the Bonnie Burn Road redevelopment, which is our Mount Laurel Ordinance in this area?

THE WITNESS: She's got it.

ATTORNEY BUTLER: Okay, it's up.

ATTORNEY BUTLER:

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- Q. Now, to your knowledge, before the good mayor and council of Watchung adopted Bonnie Burn Road Redevelopment District, did they do a traffic study?
 - A. I don't believe so.
- Q. Okay. Now, during the Mount Laurel process before Judge Miller, we had the Fair Housing Corporation, we had BNE, which was the former owner under the contract, we had the master planner, was any traffic study done?
- 12 A. I don't believe so. I haven't seen one.
 - Q. Okay. But to cover all that, I guess, in the Bonnie Burn Road Redevelopment Ordinance they have Paragraph K, Additional Requirements, which talks all about Traffic Impact Study; does it not?
 - A. Yes.
 - Q. Okay. Now, have you thoroughly reviewed Paragraph K?
 - A. Yes.
 - Q. Now. In your opinion, does this application with the light comply with the requirements of Paragraph K?
- 25 A. No.

Q. All right. Now, I would like you to specifically read that part of Paragraph K which you find is not in compliance, which you find this site plan with the light is not in compliance.

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I want you to read and I want you to tell me why you conclude that the site plan does not -- with the light, does not conform to any part of particular (sic) K that you read?

A. It's Paragraph A, which is the first subsection. It says, "The existing network available to serve the proposed development, as well as the proposed network within the -- within the development itself and the surroundings shall be -- will be affected by the proposed development." I'm skipping some words. "This analysis shall include the capacity of the existing and proposed roadways."

So obviously we had a discussion. The capacity of Bonnie Burn Road is being exceeded by the traffic signal at the driveway. And then it goes, in the last sentence, the last portion of the Paragraph A it says, "Including unsafe intersections and vertical or horizontal alignment." When we have those --

Q. Let me interrupt you. Let me interrupt you. You have to apologize. I have got to

apologize, okay. But take a look at OW-4, which is the queuing associated with the University of Florida 2021 Highway Capacity Software.

In your --

- A. That's what I was looking for.
- Q. -- it shows the contour of the road pretty clearly with your queuing; does it not?
 - A. Yes.

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- O. What does it show?
- 10 A. It shows the alignment and then, as we 11 all know, the road is headed uphill as we -- as one 12 travels west on Bonnie Burn.
 - Q. And now, you have traveled on or about this area many times?
 - A. Yes.
 - Q. Okay. And you're testifying now from your personal experience?
 - A. Yes.
- 19 Q. So the road is curved; is that correct?
- A. Yes. There's a reverse curve. It
 goes -- it goes to the left and then it goes back to
 the right.
 - Q. Okay. And while OW-4 is not a topography, so it doesn't have engineering on it, what is your testimony as to whether the -- the

vertical contours of the road?

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- A. Well, what happens is when the traffic queues up, it's projected by either my calculations or Eric Keller's calculations, coming around the curve people have a tendency to not see the car in front of them stopped and it creates a hazardous situation.
 - O. You're describing --
- A. Both the horizontal and the vertical alignment --
 - Q. -- present a dangerous situation?
 - A. Yes. Unsafe.
 - Q. Unsafe, okay.
- A. And then what also happens is when people are queued and they're Level of Service F and they're stopped, they have a tendency to push the limits of the movements and not wait for the next signal change. They have a tendency to go forward.
- Q. Okay. Now, are you through explaining that part of Paragraph K that you feel as though violates the ordinance -- the site plan violates the ordinance?
 - A. Yes.
- Q. Okay. Is there any other part of Paragraph K that does the same?

1 Yes, Paragraph B. Α.

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- 2. O. Paragraph B. Would you read Paragraph 3 B?
 - It says, "The analysis shall evaluate Α. the current and planned development in the surrounding -- in surroundings including individual residences or businesses on Bonnie Burn Road, including Weldon Quarry."
 - Ο. Now how is that violated?
 - Well, as I said, a significant Α. percentage of the Weldon Quarry traffic, both their trucks and the patrons, are using this approach and it has a negative -- a significant negative impact to the operations of the quarry. And as one can also see, that the second plotting that I prepared extends beyond the property and blocks driveways to the east of the subject property.
 - How does all this affect, it says Ο. "individual residences"?
 - Well, when the traffic queues up it Α. blocks the driveway and it also has a negative -- a significant negative impact to the Weldon Quarry operation.
 - Okay. Well, to my knowledge, there is Ο. no homes on the quarry side of Bonnie Burn Road?

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- A. Right. But there are on the south side.
 - Q. Okay. And there will be queuing there as well?
- 5 A. Yes.

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- Q. All right. Now, is there any other part of K that you feel as though this site plan violates?
 - A. Paragraph E.
 - Q. What does that say?
- A. "The redevelopment will be responsible for off-tract site improvements related to traffic, such as a traffic light, acceleration and deceleration lanes to achieve sufficient sight distance and related improvements to individual driveways serving this site, fronting onto Bonnie Burn Road."
 - Q. What is the problem with that?
- A. The alignment of the roadway has a negative impact on sight distance when you have 35 or 45 cars queued, waiting for the traffic light to go westbound. And so the sight distance is significantly impacted.
- 24 There's no -- there are no acceleration 25 or deceleration lanes proposed. And as I said, and

- the individual driveway operating -- well, Bonnie

 Burn Road operating at Level of Service F is a

 hazard to safe operations along -- for the motoring

 public.
- ATTORNEY BUTLER: Madam Chair, would

 you just bear with me one moment. I just want to

 check my notes. I'm sorry.

8 CHAIRPERSON SCHAEFER: No problem.

BY ATTORNEY BUTLER:

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- Q. Okay. And in your professional opinion, what concluding comments do you have regarding the site plan and the associated traffic light?
- A. Well, basically the traffic light has been developed to allow 60 cars to come out of the driveway. And your -- when we look at the balance, you're impacting 1,500 cars to accommodate 60.
 - Q. Does that make sense to you?
- A. It's a bad bet.
 - Q. I mean from a practical standpoint, should 60 cars be able to cause the queuing of 1,000 -- almost 1,500 vehicles?
 - A. Right. There's 1,500 vehicles traveling westbound in the morning. And those cars are being severely impacted and negatively impacted

- 1 by the ability to get 60 cars out of the site.
- Q. Okay. Now, you've discussed the grades and the curves, right?
 - A. Yes.

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- Q. And you have indicated that they're dangerous; is that correct?
 - A. Yes. And in both of my exhibits where I show the -- where I plot the queuing there are advanced warning signs that show the safe travel speed to go around those curves and it's listed at 25 miles per hour.
 - Q. Now, in your professional opinion, should the applicant's traffic engineer have adopted the Florida 2021 Highway Capacity Software?
 - A. Well, there was an opportunity to resubmit the plans. The plans were resubmitted.

 Many of the reports were resubmitted but the Highway Capacity Software was not updated.
- ATTORNEY BUTLER: At this time, Madam

 Chair, I have no questions of this witness.
- 21 CHAIRPERSON SCHAEFER: Thank you, Mr.
- 22 Butler.
- 23 Ms. Dory?
- MS. DORY: Thank you, Madam Chair. I
- don't know if the board's professionals have any

- comments or questions. I don't know if they want to go before me, but I can certainly ask my questions now.
 - CHAIRPERSON SCHAEFER: If you are fine, let me then go to my professionals and then I will come back to you.
- 7 ATTORNEY DORY: Sure. Thank you. 8 CHAIRPERSON SCHAEFFER: So, John, Rick,
- BOARD TRAFFIC CONSULTANT: Tracee, it would definitely be our preference to allow Mr.
- 12 Keller or the developer's team to answer any of the queries by the objector first.
 - We would be curious to see what they would have to say about Mr. Simoff's testimony prior to providing any guidance to the board.
- 17 CHAIRPERSON SCHAEFER: Okay. Ms.
- 18 Dory, back to you.

Mark, questions?

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ATTORNEY DORY: Okay. You know, the applicant is not intending on presenting any additional testimony from Mr. Keller at this time on traffic. You know, our position is that these issues are before Union County and these relate to the traffic light and this is -- information will be presented to Union County, so we're not intending on

7		addressing	
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We believe we have established that there's a -- we have done a conservative analysis and that we have met the requirements of the redevelopment plan in Section K because we have submitted a traffic impact evaluation that meets those requirements and that has been supported by the board's traffic engineer.

9 But I do have some questions for Mr.

10 | Simoff that I would like to ask.

11 CHAIRPERSON SCHAEFER: Go ahead.

12 ATTORNEY DORY: Okay.

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EXAMINATION

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16 CROSS BY ATTORNEY DORY:

- Q. So good evening, Mr. Simoff. It's nice to meet you.
- A. Good evening.
- Q. I'm glad you were able to recover and I'm also glad you're well.
 - A. Thank you.
- Q. So I heard the summary that Mr. Butler gave, with you walking through your two reports

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So I have -- and I know you have numbered

several different exhibits, but what I have received from the planning board clerk, from you, are essentially two reports. One is dated July 29th, 2021, which is identified as OW-1. And then it -- that report also had a stacking plan that was identified as OW-2, correct?

A. Yes.

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- Q. Okay. And then the second report that you submitted was a September 1st, 2021, report or memo that attached a -- some revised exhibits. They were also numbered as, I believe, OW-3 through OW-5, correct? Those were all part of your September 1st, 2021, report?
- A. Yeah, I think OW-5 was -- was the memo. There was somewhat of an overlap.
- Q. Okay. Thank you for clarifying that. So all of those documents, OW-1 through OW-5, those respond to Bowman's Traffic Evaluation that was dated May 19th, 2000 -- excuse me, May, 2019 and last revised October 7th, 2019, correct?
 - A. Yes.
- Q. And that is what Mr. Butler has been referring to as the Bowman Report, correct?
- A. Yeah, it's a Traffic of Engineering

 Evaluation.

- Q. Right. And do you understand that other traffic reports were also submitted to the planning board during the course of the application since it was filed in 2019?
- A. There was a -- I'm sometimes a little confused because there's been so many reports submitted, but there was Warrant studies that were submitted.
- Q. Yes. And you understand there was a Warrant study submitted by you and also by Bowman related to this project?
- A. Yes.

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- Q. But as far as the Bowman Report, which Mr. Butler has been referring to, the Traffic Evaluation from 2019, you have never responded to that report before you submitted your reports this year in July and September, correct?
 - A. Yes, this is the first time I have responded to that report.
- Q. Okay. Do you know why you waited so long?
 - A. It wasn't my turn.
- Q. Okay. But you did submit the Warrant study, right?
- A. Well, there's some question as to

- where the Warrant study is being reviewed.
- Q. Okay. But you understand --
- 3 ATTORNEY BUTLER: Let him finish,
- 4 | ma'am, please. Go ahead.
- 5 THE WITNESS: Initially, the Warrant
- 6 study was submitted to the planning board and then,
- 7 I might be paraphrasing it, but the Warrant study
- 8 | was then determined to be in the sole review of the
- 9 | county so it was not discussed at this board, it was
- 10 discussed -- it's being discussed at the county.
- 11 BY ATTORNEY DORY:
- 12 Q. Okay. And you understand that your --
- 13 | Weldon's attorney's position, Mr. Butler -- is that,
- 14 you know, any decision about the Warrant study and
- 15 | the traffic light is going to be made by Union
- 16 | County?

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- 17 A. Yes, that's my understanding.
- 18 Q. And Mr. Butler has also made
- 19 | submissions to Union County prepared by you related
- 20 to the traffic light; is that correct?
- 21 A. That's right. I don't agree with the
- 22 conclusions of the Warrant study submitted to Union
- 23 County.
- 24 ATTORNEY BUTLER: I think the question
- 25 | was, I think, I might be wrong, whether you

- submitted a Warrant study analysis to Union County.
- 2 Now, I might be wrong.
- Nicole, am I wrong?
- ATTORNEY DORY: Yes. I am asking if
 there have been submissions by Mr. Simoff that have
 been submitted to Union County related to the

THE WITNESS: Yes.

- 7 traffic light.
- 9 ATTORNEY DORY: Yes. Thank you.
- 10 BY ATTORNEY DORY:

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- 11 Q. Okay. And the concerns that you've 12 raised in the documents that were marked this 13 evening as OW-1 through OW-5, those are related to 14 what Mr. Butler referred to as page, Roman Numeral 15 II C-5 of the Bowman Report, correct?
 - A. Plus I -- there were some inconsistencies that I brought out, like II C-5 analyzed the exiting move from the site as two lanes and I read it as one lane.
 - Q. Right. And just looking at II C-5 -- hold on a second.
- So I'm looking at Page II C-5, which
 was attached to OW-1, perhaps it was also separately
 marked. But that's entitled, "Signalized

Intersection Results Summary, " correct?

- 1 A. Yes. And that was taken from the 2 Bowman Report.
 - Q. Right. And it's analysis generally after the light is installed?
 - A. Yes.

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- Q. So would your -- the concerns that you raised and the issues that you raised in OW-1 through OW-5 relating to the proposed intersection, signalized intersection, will those also be raised with Union County?
 - A. Yes.
- Q. And you understand, you have reviewed the redevelopment plan ordinance for this project?
 - A. Yes.
- Q. Okay. And you understand that the Borough Council has zoned for this use for 230 apartments to be developed on this property?
 - A. Yes.
- Q. So I'm looking at your statement in OW-1, the first page, which is your July 21st, 2021, memo and the third paragraph there where you state that, based on your review, you say, "The proposed access to Bonnie Burn Road will have" -- and by that you mean the traffic light; is that right?
 - A. Well, the way it has been presented to

1 this board.

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- Q. Right. Okay. Well, "Will have" -- you state there, "will have significant evident impact to the existing traffic on Bonnie Burn Road and does not satisfy the requirements of the Redevelopment Plan Ordinance."
- A. Well, "redevelopment ordinance" is what the memo says.
 - Q. Okay. Then I have quoted that accurately?
- 11 A. Yes.
- Q. Okay. And Mr. Butler questioned you, and you went through Paragraphs A, B and E of Paragraph K --
- 15 A. Yes.
 - Q. I'm sorry. So Paragraph K of the Redevelopment Plan Ordinance and then you specifically pointed to subsections K-1A, B and E, correct?
 - A. Correct.
 - Q. And would you agree that Section K of the Redevelopment Plan Ordinance provides what the redevelopment should include in its Traffic Impact Study?
- 25 A. Yes.

- Q. Okay. And it's your opinion that some of the information presented by the applicant, that you don't agree with that, is that your opinion?
- A. Well, no, I do agree. I mean, it shows Level of Service F for the westbound traffic and it shows significant queues going westbound in the morning on Bonnie Burn Road.
- Q. Okay. But you suggest in your testimony this evening that you didn't agree with the information that was presented in Page II C-5, and then you revised it, right?
- A. Well, II C-5 is inconsistent with the plan that was presented. There has not been a subsequent traffic evaluation after October 7th, 2019 to this board.
- Q. Right. And this is the first time you have raised this issue with this board, correct, in your report that was submitted --
- ATTORNEY BUTLER: That was asked and answered.
- 21 ATTORNEY DORY: Well, no. I mean...
- 22 | THE WITNESS: Well --
- 23 ATTORNEY BUTLER: It was asked and
- 24 answered. The answer was no.

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25 ATTORNEY DORY: All right, Madam

Chair. I have no further questions for Mr. Simoff.

The board has the opinion of Mr. Jahr and the applicant's traffic engineer so we're going to rely on those opinions. We believe we have presented a conservative analysis. The issues are before Union County. And Mr. Simoff indicated that these issues would also be raised again with Union County.

So we believe we have submitted a traffic evaluation that satisfied the requirements of the Redevelopment Plan, Section K.

12 ATTORNEY BUTLER: Madam Chair, may I respond?

14 CHAIRPERSON SCHAEFER: Yes, Mr.

15 Butler.

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ATTORNEY BUTLER: There's two different issues here, separate and distinct. One is the site plan application which you're hearing tonight. The other is a separate and distinct application to Union County which all counsel agree has exclusive jurisdiction over the light.

What either side submitted to the light

-- and we're going to submit a supplemental report

this week on the light to Union County -- is

separate and distinct before this board. What we

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submitted to Union County is not going to go before 1 this board. So it's a camouflage for counsel for the applicant to say, Oh, all the other traffic 3 engineer, all the other statistics that Mr. Simoff 4 5 testified to, are going to go to the county so that's enough. There's two different applications. 6 7 That's the first point I want to make. Madam Chair, the second point I would 8 9 like to ask is, is there going to be any rebuttal 10 testimony tonight on the traffic engineering report 11 submitted by Mr. Simoff? 12 CHAIRPERSON SCHAEFER: Well, according 13 to what Ms. Dory said, she says, no. 14 Correct, Ms. Dory? 15 ATTORNEY DORY: Correct. 16 ATTORNEY BUTLER: And does that mean 17 that there will be no rebuttal testimony at any 18 future hearing? 19 ATTORNEY DORY: Any future hearing before this board? Correct. 20 21 ATTORNEY BUTLER: Yes. Okay, now --

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concluding tonight and we're finishing, yes.

Madam Chair. It's about 8:00 o'clock, okay.

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ATTORNEY DORY: As long as we are

ATTORNEY BUTLER: Here is my problem,

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I'm sorry.

1 JOHN JAHR: Thank you, Mr. Butler.

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I would like to say that Mr. Simoff's testimony, I don't see a lot to have an exception with. I would say that nothing in his testimony this evening would change my opinion that was stated in my May 21st report for the board. So I see no -- no need to question him further or delve any further into this.

I think his presentation spoke for itself. And I -- I really don't have anything I want to object to over it. I think that his facts were taken from Mr. Keller's report. I would say probably 80 or 90 percent of what he testified was what was included in Mr. Keller's report and -- and then he did a nice update of Mr. Keller's analysis. So I really don't have exception with anything.

What I would say is, you know, just for the board to consider that there are traffic lights at Bonnie Burn Road and New Providence and Bonnie Burn Road and Valley Road. And I would say that, you know, bear in mind that the same traffic that's going to go through this new traffic light is currently going through those lights. So in today's condition --

ATTORNEY BUTLER: Traffic light.

JOHN JAHR: Yeah, plausible, yeah, if a light is allowed.

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I would once again like to stress to the board that should the board approve the application, you know, it is dependent upon Union County approving the traffic elements that have been so overwhelmingly discussed. So I'm certain that, you know, and I'm not -- I don't really need to say this, but, it's certainly as a condition of any approval.

And I offer myself to answer any questions that anybody might have with regard. This was very technical testimony this evening. It might be a little confusing or difficult. And if I can maybe possibly help, I would say this, the simplest way I feel I can help the board is just bear in mind, because we have all driven out here, that there are two traffic lights at either end of this project that will operate similarly to what Mr. Simoff testified to this evening.

There are capacity issues at -- at both of those locations in the existing condition and I believe that the testimony from Mr. Simoff, correct me if I'm wrong, is that this light, you know, will operate in a similar manner if not worse.

I feel that we need to let Union

-- Union County has the jurisdiction here. It's

really not our road to -- to get this deep into it.

I feel comfortable that we will get the best

guidance from the county engineer on this matter.

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It's very complicated. As you can hear Mr. Simoff made it overwhelmingly clear to all of us this evening that this is a -- this is a complicated review and it is better to go to a higher jurisdiction. And we're lucky to have that opportunity to have them -- to look at this on all of our behalf.

I offer myself up for any questions anybody might have.

ATTORNEY BUTLER: Madam Chair, Madam Chair, could Mr. Simoff very quickly, briefly respond to just a small part of Mr. Jahr's comments? This will take a couple of seconds.

THE WITNESS: Just a couple of seconds. The intersections to the east and the west have multiple lanes. What basically -- putting it in rather simplistic form, the capacity is a function of the number of lanes and the signal timing. So one lane can carry a certain number of cars, two lanes can carry twice as many cars. So

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BOARD TRAFFIC CONSULTANT:

You know,

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1	Tracee Ms. Madam Chair, Mr. Simoff has clearly
2	pointed out there have been a number of iterations
3	or differences in the lane configuration. I
4	would I would say that we have seen plans with
5	both two lanes out and one lane out. I think
б	ultimately the configuration of the 20-foot lane
7	exiting the site, whether it ends up being one lane
8	that is striped for left and right traffic, or two
9	lanes, one lane for left and the other lane for
10	right turn, will probably be the subject of the
11	county design requirements. The county will
12	ultimately choose whether that's going to be one or
13	two lanes.

The plan that is submitted to the board, I think we have seen it both ways. I guess that does cause a little bit of a challenge. And I think doesn't -- wouldn't we have to have them define that more clearly, or can we leave that to the discretion of the county engineer?

CHAIRPERSON SCHAEFER: And I will leave that to Frank, but I would think that we need that defined more clearly.

Frank?

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ATTORNEY LINUS: Yes, absolutely. We have to know -- the board has to know what plan

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Union County will decide if a light goes in or

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doesn't go in. If they decide, yes, a light is required, do they have a certain time they have to put it in by or can they say, yes, a light is required, we'll get to it. And they -- and they can take one -- you know, they can take a month or they can take, you know, two years. Is there any --

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BOARD TRAFFIC CONSULTANT: It will be the -- it will be the applicant's responsibility to provide design plans and construction plans to the satisfaction of the county and that -- that time frame will be entirely on them. So it will be the applicant's obligation.

MEMBER PENNETT: Okay, but will they put the -- when they say, yes, it's okay, yes, the light is required and it will go in within such-and-such a time?

BOARD TRAFFIC CONSULTANT: Well, ordinarily we would -- we would not let them occupy to a certain point. They would only be allowed to occupy a certain number of units or maybe the building subcode official would not let them occupy any until the light's in place.

MEMBER PENNETT: Okay. Now, another -- this is another question about the timing of the lights. You know, you have one at, you know,

New Providence, you have one at Valley and then you have one in the middle. And I know we have all been stuck at lights and they have just been timed wrong, so the light turns green, but it's still red on the other side so you can't move.

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Now, is there going to be any type of timing so that the lights are in sync with one another?

BOARD TRAFFIC CONSULTANT: I believe, if the board so directs it, I will be able to stay involved and make certain that the three lights are coordinated.

MEMBER PENNETT: Okay.

BOARD TRAFFIC CONSULTANT: Should the county -- I said a lot of shoulds, you know, a lot of ifs, right? If the county says --

MEMBER PENNETT: Yes, well, I don't -- I don't like the shoulds and ifs.

BOARD TRAFFIC CONSULTANT: Yeah. If the board says it's okay for me to stay involved, then I can -- I can certainly make sure that those three lights are going to be coordinated.

MEMBER PENNETT: Okay. Great, thank you.

ATTORNEY BUTLER: Madam, could --

probably a, you know, a site plan exception that, you know, would not require planning board approval.

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So it's the applicant's position that, you know, the conditions imposed by Union County would certainly agree with. To the extent it requires site plan approval to -- to return to the board for that, I guess we would do it, but you know, having one lane or two, I don't know that under your ordinance it would require us to return to the board.

ATTORNEY LINNUS: Yeah. I'm not sure I agree with you on that, Ms. Dory.

I think this board has site plan review and it's very clear to me now that the site plan that the board is reviewing shows one lane and that is what the -- the board would be reviewing.

In the event Union County does not approve the traffic signal, you absolutely have to come back to the board with a new plan. I would say that in the event the county requires two lanes, I think you have to revisit the board to -- to get that site plan changed because you're asking this board to act on an application for site plan approval showing one lane out.

Those are my current thoughts.

ATTORNEY DORY: Okay. Well, the applicant would just like the opportunity to -- to look at that. You know, our understanding was that, you know, if Union County imposed conditions that didn't require site plan approval that, you know, we could just make those changes and report back to the board.

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ATTORNEY LINNUS: Well, this board has exclusive jurisdiction over the site plan, the entire site plan as presented by the applicant, subject, of course, to outside agency approvals.

CHAIRPERSON SCHAEFER: And quite honestly, Ms. Dory, it has been a big concern of ingress/egress out of this site during the full term of this application to the point that we asked the previous owner or previous applicant, are there ways -- other ways in or out for emergency purposes. So now that is brought to light. And shame on us for not picking up one lane, but I think two lanes is important, especially if you want people being able to get out of there quickly. And if you have got people wanting to make a right-hand turn, one lane doesn't afford them to do that while they're waiting for a red light to turn, in my opinion.

Questions from other planning board

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Page 82 1 members? VICE-CHAIRMAN SPEENEY: A statement? 3 CHAIRPERSON SCHAEFER: Statement, 4 sorry. 5 VICE-CHAIRMAN SPEENEY: Yeah, I would think -- and relative to the one lane or two lanes, 6 if -- even it was designed as one lane, local traffic will make it two lanes. 8 9 I think that's just human nature. 10 20 feet is wide enough for two cars to -- one make a 11 left and one make a right. And I really -- I really 12 don't see whether we get the applicant to make it 13 two-lane road or one-lane road, it's going to happen as two lanes, period. 14 15 CHAIRPERSON SCHAEFER: Mayor Balla? 16 MAYOR BALLA: Yeah, the question for, 17 I think it was Mr. Simoff. 18 THE WITNESS: Yes. 19 MAYOR BALLA: That's dated July of 20 2021? 21 MAYOR BALLA: Yes. 2.2 MAYOR BALLA: What was the actual date 23 that the count was taken? 2.4 THE WITNESS: I took -- I looked at the 25 counts that were in the -- that were in the Bowman

1 report and I think it was 2019. 2. MAYOR BALLA: Okay. And do you know 3 what day of the week? THE WITNESS: Well, the counts -- the 4 5 counts at Valley Road and -- and Bonnie Burn were taken on March 19th, I don't know what date that 6 7 was. ATTORNEY BUTLER: St. Joseph's Day. 8 9 THE WITNESS: And it seems they were 10 all taken on March 19th, Tuesday. 11 MAYOR BALLA: Of '19? 12 THE WITNESS: Yeah. And then I -- I 13 supplemented, going back to ancient history here, I did some counts in June, I believe, of 2019 at 14 15 Valley Road and they were 5 or 10 percent, maybe 16 even more higher, and John Jahr asked that the 17 applicant use my higher counts in his analysis. 18 MAYOR BALLA: Okay. Thank you. 19 THE WITNESS: Because again I 20 believe -- just one more comment, the quarry was, 21 you know, in -- in March, the quarry's not as active 2.2 as it would be in June.

23 CHAIRPERSON SCHAEFER: Other questions 24 from board members?

Karen?

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MEMBER PENNETT: Yeah, this is another general question. Turn on red, is there going to be a no-turn-on-red sign at the exit of the -- the development?

BOARD TRAFFIC CONSULTANT: That's

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BOARD TRAFFIC CONSULTANT: That's going to depend upon the detailed review of the plan by the county engineer. There are criteria that will be utilized in order to determine if that's the correct treatment.

10 MEMBER PENNETT: Okay. Thank you.

THE WITNESS: I might just add that -- that sometimes -- many times is a function of sight distance.

MEMBER PENNETT: Okay. So the county decides that, okay.

CHAIRPERSON SCHAEFER: Other questions from the board members? Okay, I'm going to open it up to the public.

MEMBER SPINGLER: Tracee? I'm sorry,
Tracee. I have a question for Mr. Jahr.

Mr. Jahr, does the updated software, which increases the ratio volume to capacity, influence your report in any way?

BOARD TRAFFIC CONSULTANT: No, I don't feel that the change in the -- the updated software

would change -- change my opinion that is noted in my May 21st report.

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MEMBER SPINGLER: Okay. Thank you.

BOARD TRAFFIC CONSULTANT: Although I agree with Mr. Simoff that it's always better to use the more updated -- I am confident that the county will probably insist on even newer software called, Synchro because this Highway Capacity software will only analyze one light at a time. I'm quite confident that Union County will require all three lights be analyzed in order to get that progression that we want to have. And that is going to be an even newer software called Synchro.

So I'm very comfortable with the results of our report and also very comfortable that the county will -- will see to it that the even newer software will be utilized.

MEMBER SPINGLER: Thank you.

CHAIRPERSON SCHAEFER: Other questions

from, excuse me, planning board members?

MEMBER NORA: Can I ask a question?

22 CHAIRPERSON SCHAEFER: Yvette.

MEMBER NORA: Yeah, I would like to ask a question to Mr. Simoff regarding the stacking plan, OW-2, OW-4, the 31 cars there or however many

numbers are there. It's 7:15 to 8:15 in the morning is the peak hours.

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Are buses factored into that or would they make a difference? You know, just -- it is a bus route, stops on Mareu Drive and along Bonnie Burn.

THE WITNESS: I don't -- I don't believe that the -- I mean, my input to the capacity calculations did not have any stopping associated with school buses. So I would -- that would just add to the situation.

MEMBER NORA: Because you do have the Valley View Road going down that way and then they vary later.

THE WITNESS: It's a planning tool.

CHAIRPERSON SCHAEFER: Yvette, that might be a question for -- for our traffic engineer, John.

BOARD TRAFFIC CONSULTANT: The school buses would have been in the original counts that were done in 2019 so I would say they're factored into to a great extent.

I don't think any bus route changes have taken place. I did speak with the police approximately two months ago to double-check that

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1	and to their knowledge there were no changes in bus
2	routes since 2019 other than, of course, what, you
3	know, took place for COVID.

So I would say that the bus routes are already part of the counts that Mr. Simoff and Mr. Keller used in their analysis.

Would you not agree, Hal?

THE WITNESS: The other question is what happens when a school bus stops traffic?

BOARD TRAFFIC CONSULTANT: I don't

know that, but school buses don't stop on Bonnie Burn Road.

13 MEMBER NORA: Mareu Drive.

BOARD TRAFFIC CONSULTANT: Yeah, they

come off onto -- right, they come off the road.

16 | They don't stop on Bonnie Burn.

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THE WITNESS: Okay.

BOARD TRAFFIC CONSULTANT: Unless something has changed, Ms. Nora.

Are you aware of school buses stopping on Bonnie Burn?

MEMBER NORA: It's been a while since.

MEMBER PENNETT: Can I say something?

BOARD TRAFFIC CONSULTANT: Yes.

CHAIRPERSON SCHAEFFER: Go ahead,

Karen.

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2. MEMBER PENNETT: At one point I believe 3 the Descono(ph) family, they had three children in the school system. Right now they've all graduated 4 5 except for one. I think it just depends on who lives in the other houses on Bonnie Burn Road 6 whether the school buses -- the school buses go if -- so if a resident of Bonnie Burn Road has a 8 child in the school system, the bus will stop in 10 front of their driveway. 11 ATTORNEY BUTLER: Which would be --12 MEMBER PENNETT: It just depends on 13 who lives on the street. 14 CHAIRPERSON SCHAEFER: Okav. Anv other planning board members? 15 16

Okay, I'm going to now open it up to the public.

ATTORNEY BUTLER: Madam Chair, Bill Butler had a question.

20 CHAIRPERSON SCHAEFER: Yes.

ATTORNEY BUTLER: I'm sorry, it will be quick. I just want an explanation. Mr. Simoff pointed out that C-5 anticipates two lanes. In the site plan it's one lane.

Was it ruled tonight by the board that

1 the applicant is to revise the site plan to two lanes there or -- or am I incorrect in that 3 assumption? CHAIRPERSON SCHAEFER: You're 4 5 incorrect. We didn't -- we didn't make that 6 statement. I think it was stated that the county will be the one to -- John, please correct me if I'm wrong, that the county will dictate. 8 9 We do have final jurisdiction over the 10 site plan, but right now it's one lane. And like 11 Don said, traffic is really going to create it -- or 12 the car lanes are going to create itself in a 13 20-foot-wide boulevard. 14 ATTORNEY BUTLER: But we do have an 15 inconsistency in the site plan and the traffic 16 report that was submitted as part of this 17 application. 18 CHAIRPERSON SCHAEFER: Frank? 19 ATTORNEY LINNUS: I'm going to defer 20 to John Jahr on the inconsistency since it's a 21 purely, solely a traffic issue. 2.2 John, what do you think about the 23 inconsistency?

Well, I

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substantively change what is going to happen next. What, you know, I think what happens next is the county is going to look at it and they're ultimately going to come back and tell us whether it needs to be one lane or two lanes.

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So the fact that the board is reviewing the application based on one lane, all right, but under a condition that the county is going to review it and make its recommendation, I would say that, you know, that the -- the county could say, okay yes, one lane is fine or the county can come back and say, well, we want two lanes.

Well, if that's the case then, you know, I would say that -- my guess would be the board would be comfortable with either one or two lanes coming out of the development, whichever the county engineer feels is the safest. And that would be my opinion as well.

I, you know, right now, I would say that -- that they're proposing one lane and if -- if the county engineer comes back and says that that one lane will be adequate then, you know, I would be in agreement with that. But the county could also come back and say they would prefer to see two lanes because of just what Mr. Speeney said, that people

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- are just going to do it anyway. Yeah, 20 feet wide is really wide, so...
- 3 ATTORNEY LINNUS: John, are you 4 satisfied that the traffic testimony and the reports
- 5 that have been submitted are appropriate for a
- 6 one-lane exit?
- 7 BOARD TRAFFIC CONSULTANT: Yes. Well,

traffic to wait behind the bus while everyone comes
in.

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So I don't know if this was factored into anyone's reports or not. It seems like -
CHAIRPERSON SCHAEFER: Mr. Kitt, can I ask you a question? You're saying Johnston and Mareu? Mareu is part of --

DENNIS KITT: I'm sorry, I mean Bonnie Burn. I'm sorry, I misspoke. At the intersection of Bonnie Burn. So right after, you know, I have -- I have seen the bus, the bus route comes down -- comes eastbound on Valley, takes a right onto Bonnie Burn, and then right as it arrives at Mareu Drive it stops and picks up students, who I believe live on Mareu Drive. They seem to, you know, walk down the road and gather there. So...

ATTORNEY LINNUS: Mr. Kitt, Mr. Kitt, this is Frank Linnus, the board attorney. It sounds like you're drifting into statements and comments. We have to swear you in. This is the time for you

- 1 to ask questions of the witness.
- DENNIS KITT: Right. So I just -- you
- 3 know, my -- so my question --
- 4 ATTORNEY LINNUS: So what is your
- 5 | question, sir?
- 6 DENNIS KITT: My question is
- 7 | whether -- it's just to confirm whether or not, you
- 8 know, that was taken into account as part of the
- 9 reports?
- I came away with the impression that,

THE WITNESS: The volume is included, but the stopping of traffic is not. If the -- if the the school bus stops traffic with their flashing lights to accommodate the children, that's not included in the assumptions.

CHAIRPERSON SCHAEFER: Mr. Kitt, your second question?

DENNIS KITT: Sure, I guess my second question -- and maybe this is out of scope. I -- it may relate more to the process before Union County, but I was wondering, you know, Mr. Simoff, or if -- if or the other traffic engineers, if you have considered any other options in terms of, you know, possible mitigation of traffic in connection with constructing the development, whether it -- whether it involves widening Bonnie Burn Road to be two

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So we will start with Mr. Butler.

Mr. Butler.

Okay. And thank you

witness, and we only had one witness.

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We're objecting to this application predicated upon traffic. We understand Mount Laurel is an important project. We understand that all towns are subject to Mount Laurel obligation. Our problem is here that this site is not appropriate for 230 units because of traffic generated on an already congested road. "Congested" meaning that it can't take any more traffic. And this takes more traffic.

And this not only -- traffic interrupts Weldon, but it interrupts the general traveling public because Bonnie Burn Road is a major artery between Route 78 and Route 22. Heavily traveled road in both directions.

I rely upon Mr. Simoff's report of
July 29th, 2021, dated OW-1, in which he uses the
applicant's traffic generation numbers. He also
uses the traffic counts. Even though they were in
March and the quarry is much busier in our hotter
months than it is in March, we accepted them.
Because even with them we show, I think we show,
that it is ridiculous to have a small number of
cars, about 62, interrupt and stop for 12 seconds
1,500 cars.

The problem with the light is that it stops traffic. That's the problem. It stops traffic. Now we know the traffic -- the light issue is Union County. So let's wait for Union County. So my comments are predicated upon you got the light because you're asking for conditional approval.

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I think Mr. Simoff used the figures from the applicant's engineer against him to show that he's going to increase gridlock. He's going to cause further delay.

We also pointed out that under Section K of the Land Development Ordinance, which was signed by the present Mayor -- of course, he inherited this. He didn't create this. Keith signed it because it was all done before he went in. But it requires a traffic study. Because, I represent to you, that nobody -- Judge Miller, housing, the fair housing authority, the planning board -- nobody did a traffic study to determine this.

In my humble opinion, this should not be considered vacant land to accommodate 230 units. It probably should be accommodated for 23 units. Of course the Mayor and council, in its wisdom, passed the Bonnie Burn Road Redevelopment District, but

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they were aware of traffic. They were keenly aware of traffic. And that's where K comes in, Paragraph K.

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And before I get to Paragraph K, I just want you to look at the -- the queuing, the resulting queuing from the -- from the modern University of Florida. Highway Capacity Software which -- which shows tremendous, tremendous queuing. A backup of 1,152 feet and 45 cars. This is unbelievable in every -- in every scale, every part of the hour it gets longer and longer.

I don't know whether it goes down to the intersection of Bonnie Burn Road and New Providence Road, but we're going to find out if you ever adopt this. This has to be good planning.

I know Mount Laurel is important. But you can't disregard your planning obligations, otherwise, you're doing great detriment to not only the present but the future traveling public. And the future traveling public is probably what you should be more concerned about than Weldon. The future traveling public doesn't have the money to hire a Butler or -- or a Simoff, but we do and we did. And it's not only Weldon that's affected traffic-wise, but the traveling public, which

includes probably half of you.

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Regarding Paragraph K, it's a dangerous intersection. You go out there, you take your life in your own hands. When I go out there I park at the firehouse. I'm nervous when I go out there.

And I have been out there 100 times. Believe me, over the last 20 years, I've been out there at least 100 times.

It's up and down. It's curvy. I've been there and experienced personal accidents. Of course, now, this is a summation. Summation isn't evidential. Either is an introduction. It's not -- it's not evidential, it's argument. And that's what I'm doing, I'm making an argument. I'm not a witness. But for the reasons expressed by Mr. Simoff Subparagraph A is violated in at least two -- in four sections. And since he just testified to them, I'm not going to bore you with -- when you repeat them, but this is a dangerous intersection that's gridlocked now and it's going to get worse.

I have -- I have no further questions.

I'm sorry, I have no further comments.

ATTORNEY LINNUS: Last name? 4 5 SHIMIN QIAN: O-I-A-N. 6 ATTORNEY LINNUS: Thank you. 7 I just want to SHIMIN OIAN: Okay. make a comment about the scale of this development 8 9 and its potential impact to our town. 10 Just let me quote the existing 11 population of Watchung which is standing at below 12 6,000. And this proposed development alone we're 13 going to see 230 units, which could bring in, you know, close to 800, 900 new residents. 14 15 Okay, so what I heard people were 16 saying, okay, it's affordable housing that is a 17 obligation. That is fine. I am in support of that. 18 And when I look at the numbers, the Watchung's 19 remaining low-income housing obligation before 2025 20 is 38 units. In other words, we do not need to 21 build 230 units, which is way more than what this 2.2 town can accommodate to fulfill our affordable 23 housing obligations. 2.4 And what we can see from the scale of 25 this proposed development, we can see the traffic

impact which we just heard the testimony. And we can also imagine the estimate of the project project the impact to Watchung's school systems with 230 rental families. And our existing Valley View Middle School population current pupil numbers is 295. The Bayberry Elementary School, the current pupils numbers are 341. And this proposed development sits on 41-acre woodland on a steep slope. Along a steep two-lane Bonnie Burn Road that is already congested without the influx of this, what I call, overdevelopment that brings.

And I just have no way -- whichever way that I look at it, this -- this scale of this project is simply incredible. It's not something that I would -- any sane person would agree that -- that this town could -- could absorb.

So I ask, you know, our planning board who -- and most of you are residents of this town also -- really consider, you know, the -- the tremendous impact this -- this development project could take this town. And, you know, vote your conscious. Vote, you know, for -- for this town's residents, the 6,000 residents.

Thank you.

CHAIRPERSON SCHAEFER: Thank you.

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Thank you.

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Any other public comments?

3 | SCOTT SEIDEL: Scott Seidel.

4 CHAIRPERSON SCHAEFER: Can you give us

5 your address, Mr. Seidel?

SCOTT SEIDEL: Certainly. 1020

7 Johnston Drive.

I have a few comments listening to the testimony this evening on this project. It certainly seems to be a much larger scale than would be appropriate for that site.

I'm concerned the traffic counts were done in March when the Weldon operation was much slower than it normally is in the summer months.

I'm concerned that plans that are inconsistent are being sent to the county for review. Over the years I have been before planning boards before and I don't understand why we would send a plan that may or may not be the right one to the county for them to review and get back to Watchung on it. I think the plans that are sent should be the one that they want reviewed and not one that we're going to let them decide which version of it that it should be. It should be the consistent plan.

I would think a smaller development would be more appropriate for this site.

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I have only lived here just this year, although I bought my house a year and a half, and I have been here all the time in this area. And in the winter when we get some snow or ice, and not much of it, that road gets closed. And I don't know whether consideration has been given to what will happen in that circumstance with all these cars for the 230 units are going to go.

That road, Bonnie Burn Road, is quite busy right now. And just to add this volume of traffic to it, to me, doesn't seem to make sense.

And I think the project should be scaled back.

CHAIRPERSON SCHAEFER: Thank you.

Any other public --

ATTORNEY LINNUS: Madam Chair, I think it's appropriate now to ask Nicole Dory, the applicant's attorney, to confirm as to whether the plan that they're seeking approval for tonight, the one -- let's call it the one-lane plan, is the same plan that will be presented to the county.

Nicole?

ATTORNEY DORY: Yes, my understanding is that the one-lane plan will be presented to the

1 | county.

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ATTORNEY LINNUS: Well, I want to go -- you to go a little further than that. If this board takes action on a site plan, the one-lane plan, that will be the plan that will go to the county.

ATTORNEY DORY: Yes, we will submit the plans that are approved by the planning board to the county.

10 ATTORNEY LINNUS: Okay, thank you.

CHAIRPERSON SCHAEFER: Continuing with public comments. Anybody else from the public that wants to speak? Okay. I close the public.

DENNIS KITT: Ms. Madam Chair?

Apologies. It's Mr. Dennis Kitt again. This time with comment instead of questions.

I don't know if I -- do you need me to restate my address?

19 CHAIRPERSON SCHAEFER: Please.

DENNIS KITT: Okay. Again, my name is

Dennis Kitt. I live at 1065 Johnston Drive.

You know, just wanted to echo that, you

23 know, that I think, look, that we -- we all

24 understand our Mount Laurel obligations. We all

25 understand that there is an issue with, you know, a

lack of affordable housing in our country and we need -- we all need to do something about it.

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I think that this plan is -- you know, the scale of this plan is just not suited for the site. I think we should build on this site. I think we should build affordable housing on the site.

I think 230 units, you know, particularly when you compare it with what is sort of built on equivalent sites throughout this region in this part of the state, it's just, you know, way out of -- way out of line with what we've seen -- what we're seeing in other parts of the county. For example, down in Scotch Plains we might have a development that is this large, but which has direct access to Route 22 or, you know, the sites in Berkeley Heights that have direct access to I-78. Similar scale, but much more direct access to, you know, to -- to amenities and to, you know, roads and -- and public transportation and the like, whereas there's not going to be anything for this site.

I mean, I haven't seen any plans about, you know, putting a bus in, for example. You know, other -- any sort of traffic mitigation, you know,

it's -- it's just sort of frustrating to see how, you know, everything is focused on just, you know, are these -- is a traffic light going to be enough?

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I mean, if there's something that is going to be built on this scale, I mean I would -- I would wish to see studies done about widening the road, two lanes each direction. Bonnie Burn is already four lanes, two lanes each direction for much of its length, except for this segment between Valley and New Providence.

You know, I would, suggest, you know, and I understand, you all of you, I'm sure, have the town's best interest at heart to follow very closely the proceedings before Union County. You know, if this road ends up being widened, I think there's a question as to what to do about the intersection with Johnston and Bonnie Burn because there's no way one is going to be able to make a left turn at that intersection unless a light is put at that intersection as well. And, you know, maybe -- maybe -- maybe we do need a light there. That is an area that is prone to accidents.

But, anyhow, I have -- I have gone on for long enough. Thank you for your patience and for -- for listening.

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CHAIRPERSON SCHAEFER: Thank you. And thank you, Mr. Kitt.

Any other public comments?

Hearing none, I now close the public comment section.

Ms. Dory, before we go back to you, Mr.

Butler, did you want to add to your closing

argument?

ATTORNEY BUTLER: Excuse me. I had the mic turned off. Oh, I'm sorry. No, Madam Chair.

12 CHAIRPERSON SCHAEFER: Thank you.

Okay, Ms. Dory.

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14 ATTORNEY DORY: Thank you, Madam
15 Chair. I'll just -- I will try to be brief.

So on behalf of the applicant, Bonnie
Burn Urban Redevelopers -- Urban Renewal, excuse me,
we greatly appreciate all of your attention and your
time that you have paid to this application. I know
there have been many, many meetings and it has been
a long time, but, you know, this is really an
important moment for the board and also the Borough.

This site plan application, although it was filed back in 2019, this project has really been about 30 years in the making. So, you know, maybe

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over 30 years when this property was -- it was the first time this property was contemplated as a site for affordable housing. And that was to meet the Borough's Mount Laurel constitutional obligation.

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The property comprises four tax lots. It's nearly 42 acres. And the Borough adopted the Bonnie Burn Redevelopment Plan in 2018 to allow for this development of 230 units which would include 46 affordable housing units.

And as part of this development the applicant is also dedicating 60 percent of the property, over 24 acres, to be permanently deed restricted as a conservation area so it will never be developed.

And the residential development will also include, you know, in addition to that it has various amenities and carefully designed landscaping for the residents. And all of this is -- is also for the great benefit of the Borough.

The project has been considered by the board's planner, Mr. Healey, several times. Most recently the redevelopment plan was considered by Mr. Healey in recommending amendments to refine that plan. And Mr. Healey in his July 13th, 2021, report he explained that the Bonnie Burn Redevelopment Plan

is a key, I quote, he said, "A key mechanism of the Borough's Housing Element and Fair Share Plan."

And he said that by amending that plan to allow for this project and this site plan application, you know, the board is directly implementing a component of the Borough's Master Plan.

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And as I said, the borough has been trying to implement this plan for over 30 years. The borough filed an affordable housing declaratory judgment action in 2015. And it resolved that with a settlement agreement with Fair Share Housing Center. And that required the adoption of the Bonnie Burn Redevelopment Plan to allow for this project.

So as a result of that settlement the Superior Court of New Jersey granted the borough a final judgment of compliance and repose that has provided continued immunity from builder's remedy lawsuits.

So it was that affordable housing obligation that really prompted the counsel to ask this board to study whether this property was in need of redevelopment. And several years ago the board held a hearing. It reviewed a report by a planner and determined that the standard for an area

in need of redevelopment had been met. And based upon this board's advice and recommendation the Borough Council agreed.

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So it was on October 4th, 2018, that the counsel first adopted this detailed redevelopment plan for this area creating the Bonnie Burn Redevelopment Area. And over the years since then the council has consistently adopted amendments to that plan to make this development a reality.

So I think it's important to note that while this plan for this development, this inclusionary development, was adopted several years ago, with every single plan amendment this board has consistently found that the uses and the detailed requirements proposed by the redevelopment plan are consistent with the Borough's Master Plan.

And I hope you will agree with me that during the course of the many hearings for this application and all of the submissions made, that -- and all the testimony you have heard, that the applicant has demonstrated that this application fully complies with the redevelopment plan ordinances requirements.

So I mean, consistent with the redevelopment plan, the application is consistent

with the plan's requirements as well as the various concept plans and diagrams that were attached to the redevelopment plan.

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You know, the development is largely contained into the middle of the property with wetlands and streams and -- and regulated buffers left basically undisturbed. Buffers and, you know, heights in -- in the details and diagrams in the redevelopment plan have been followed. Buffers are -- have been maintained around the entire site.

And the project also includes amenities required by the plan, such as the clubhouse. It also includes a pool, playground, and a pedestrian network and ample parking.

And as you have heard much discussion about the project also includes traffic controls. And these include lane widening and a light at the project entrance that is currently before Union County for approval. And that traffic light has been recommended by the board's traffic engineer as well as the applicant's. And the applicant will also be responsible for the installation of all of these improvements.

I know you -- you've heard from Weldon and Mr. Butler and Mr. Simoff. They responded to

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reports that the applicant had submitted in May and -- and revised in October of 2019. They responded to those reports two years later almost.

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So it's the applicant's position, as I've stated and also as acknowledged by Mr. Simoff, that the borough has zoned for this use and these units. And then also that the decision on the traffic light lies with Union County.

The applicant has provided, you know, reports on traffic to the board. And the applicant's analysis, and we think also that of Mr. Simoff's, shows that we have been overly conservative and we think that the actual traffic operations will probably be much better.

But for purposes of the board's review I think it's important to -- to consider that the board's traffic engineer stated tonight that in his opinion, his May 20, 2021, report that was favorable to the traffic light, that opinion has not changed. Mr. Jahr and Mr. Simoff have agreed, you know, on the information presented. And that these issues about the traffic light are going to be decided by Union County, another agency.

But for purposes of this board to review it, you know, the board really has to look at

the requirements of the redevelopment plan. And I hope you will agree with me that this application really complies to a T with the redevelopment plan and that includes Paragraph K. We submitted a traffic evaluation that complied with that paragraph.

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You know, the board's planner, he submitted a report in May of this year. Our planner pointed out in his testimony that the board's planner used the word "complies" at least 25 times when evaluating the application against the many, many detailed requirements of the redevelopment plan.

And I think probably since May we probably have added the word "complies" a few more times on top of that because we have made some submissions to -- to further revise the plan.

So at this point there are really only three minor design-related waivers or -- or construction-related waivers or variances for the application. The first is for the movement of topsoil off the site during development. And that's to prevent unnecessary destruction of forested areas;

The second is to use single stripe

instead of hairpin striping for parking stalls since this is a residential development;

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And the third is a de minimis exception from the Residential Site Improvement Standards to have a sidewalk on one side of the loop road. And with the applicant's last submission we also added more sidewalks to -- more sidewalk connections to address some of the board's concerns on that last item.

But these are really more like de minimis waivers than variances. We did provide planning testimony to support them, but these issues really relate to other general Borough ordinances and -- and also the Residential Site Improvement Standards. They are not requirements of the borough's redevelopment plan for this project.

But more importantly the applicant's testimony has established that the project still functions safely and efficiently and meets all of the standards of the redevelopment plan even if with these minor deviations.

So, you know, our planner also mentioned that the development generally promotes the efficient use of land and as well as environmental preservation. You know, you're saving

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60 percent of this site and placing it into a conservation area.

And I think, most importantly, the plan achieves the fundamental purpose of what it was intended to do and that's years of effort to promote the development of affordable housing in the Borough, which is what led the council to find that the property is in need of redevelopment.

So on behalf of the applicant, we thank you very much for your attention to this matter.

And we request that you act favorably on the project and the application. We are requesting that the planning board vote on the application's request for preliminary site plan approval.

And pursuant to our -- our discussions at the last meeting, you know, the applicant will agree to resubmit plans for final site plan approval on a separate date, hopefully soon, so that the board can separately vote on final site plan approval for the application.

So thank you very much. That's all I have.

CHAIRPERSON SCHAEFER: Okay, thank

24 you.

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25 Frank?

ATTORNEY LINNUS: Okay, the hearing is 1 2. concluded. Here are the options that the board has: 3 One of the options is to deliberate tonight and take action, either yea or nay. And the action would 19 20 be approval of preliminary site plan only with standard conditions and we could discuss some of the 21 2.2 conditions. 23 The other option you have would be to 24 deny the plan tonight, and that would be the action

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of the board. And then depending on that action, I

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would prepare a memorializing resolution within 45 days or so to reflect the board's action.

That is one option, yea or nay tonight, take action.

Second option would be to defer action tonight and authorize me to prepare a resolution, either yea or nay for consideration at one of the next meetings.

VICE-CHAIRMAN SPEENEY: Chair.

CHAIRPERSON SCHAEFER: Who's speaking?

Frank, if -- if there are any changes to that resolution, in other words, if we get it early enough and we give you some feedback, et cetera, but at the meeting itself, if there are any changes to be made, those changes can be made online, I mean, we can do that right -- right there and just have the chair and the secretary initial the changes.
