

Our best wishes to Freddie in all his future endeavors! We are equally elated to let you know that Scott Anderle has been promoted to Chief of Police. We wish our outgoing Chief, Andrew Hart, a wonderful retirement and thank him for his 26 years of dedicated service. Additionally, we congratulate Dámaris Quiñones-Gray as she takes over the role of Recreation Coordinator from Linda Monetti who has retired after 14+ years of dedicated service and all the remarkable recreational programs she has created in addition to the many special events. We wish her too all the best in her retirement.



Our Administrative staff, Councilmembers, First Responders and Volunteers are hard at work with particular focus on public safety, infrastructure, recreation, and wellness. Our continued focus on public safety improvements include: new surveillance cameras at Mobus Field, Philips Field, and the waterfalls parking lot. In addition, license plate reader cameras were installed at key points in the Borough to alert our Police Department (PD) to any stolen vehicles entering our community. Our Council and PD are committed and proactive about security. These measures will help prevent future car break-ins and thefts. Please do your part by not leaving valuables in open view and by keeping your vehicles locked at all times. I am also so pleased to report that the 2023/24 school year will now include, for the first time, a dedicated School Resource Officer to increase safety within our schools. We thank the BOE for its Shared Service Agreement, and our school administrators for making school safety a priority for our children.

Infrastructure repairs and upgrades are ongoing and so important. Culverts, catch basins, road repairs are critical for the control of stormwaters. Kudos to our Engineers, Bill McClave our Public Works Manager and his team who do a great job maintaining our Borough roads, infrastructure, and parks – if you see them, please say hi, and thanks. By the way, have you been following the latest improvements at Mobus Field? These facilities are expected to be open and available to the public by mid-September. More improvements are in the works, so please keep sharing your ideas with us.

Commission for putting together and volunteering to make this such an awesome time for all. The Farmers market now located at the newly paved Best Lake parking lot has generated record breaking attendance. Council's Corner

It is the 2nd bi-annual newsletter and there is much to report. The Mobus Field Improvement project continues with construction underway. The conversion of 1-tennis court into 2-pickle ball courts, full renovation of the remaining 2-tennis courts, and full resurfacing of the basketball court will provide residents with the recreation services they have requested. This project was supported by a \$75,000 recreation grant to help offset costs. Additional security cameras will be installed throughout the park to ensure public safety for all, especially our children.

As with all communities, recreation space is a welcome retreat, and it is exciting to share that Phase One of Camp Endeavor is finally moving forward after more than 2-decades of being unused. A community survey resulted in a passive recreation option. Clean-up and construction are currently in progress including removal of old tennis courts, clearing and leveling the area, and seeding to provide another location for community activities and enjoyment. Opening dates will be announced once the work is complete.

On August 3rd, Watchung held a remembrance of the 50-Year Anniversary of the great flood of 1973, as a result of which 7-lives were lost, and severe damage was experienced. This event and subsequent severe rain and storm events remind us of the critical need to maintain and improve our infrastructure and work toward lake cleaning initiatives. The Borough, in conjunction with our partners at FEMA and other government entities, are constantly looking to mitigate any damage from weather related events. We cannot prevent storms, but we can prepare and protect vital areas that help to keep residents and property safe. We are actively seeking state and federal funding to fortify these infrastructures.

Other projects slated include: 2023 Road Project for Washington Rock Road, Reynolds Drive, and Meadowlark Road. The 2024 Road Project is submitted for Vail Lane, Wolford Court, and Drift Road. There are other roads that also need attention. We ask for your patience as we make repairs, work with service providers currently in construction, and evaluate roads according to severity. Phase One of the Valley Road Sidewalk Project will be completed in the coming weeks. Concrete sidewalks will be installed from Best Lake to Knightsbridge. The Circle Island landscaping project is underway and the island off Sterling Road is complete. The island across from Borough Hall will be next and once PSE&G is finished with gas line replacement, the island by the Rescue Squad will be addressed. There are so many other projects that you will see and hopefully hear about at Council Meetings. We encourage you to check the Borough Website, www.watchungnj.gov and on social media. The Council welcomes all residents to come to Council Meetings where your thoughts and comments are greatly appreciated. It is a privilege serving all the residents of Watchung and we take great pride in doing the very best we can to make our community a wonderful place to live and call home.

WATCHUNG POLICE DEPARTMENT



Introducing New Police Chief Scott Anderle

In April of 2020 the Watchung Police Department approved the use of a load-bearing body armor vest for our officers to wear on patrol. While this has been a growing trend within the law enforcement community, the

many advantages of these vests are often unknown to the public. At first look, civilians have sometimes characterized the load-bearing vests as intimidating or overly militaristic. I would like to take this opportunity to share some of the many benefits of this item to both the officer and the public.

Prior to the load-bearing vest, police officers carried most equipment on their waistband belts. The traditional police belt was adorned with a firearm, extra magazines, ammunition, a baton, handcuffs (often two pair), a radio, and chemical spray. This equipment can range in weight between twenty and thirty pounds. Over the last several years there have been advances in life-saving equipment and techniques which have increased the load carried by police officers. The modern police officer usually carries at least one tourniquet and other "Stop the Bleed" items on their person. Uniformed police officers are also tasked with wearing a body worn camera during their tour. The load-bearing body armor vest system allows police officers to distribute the weight of this equipment across the upper body, taking the bulk of the load off

of their hips and back. Load-bearing vests come with multiple pockets and pouches which gives the officer more options for added equipment. This increases the services a police officer can offer in the field.

Only a few weeks after the vests were approved, Watchung Police Officers reported significant relief from hip and back pain. Many patrol officers work twelve hour shifts consecutively, and often spend several hours at a time in a police vehicle. The shifting of the equipment weight off of the waist immediately improved the health and wellness of our officers. Police officers are also subject to very physical tasks throughout their tours. Running, performing life-saving services (CPR, carrying patients), and a myriad of other duties become easier when body armor is worn over the shirt as opposed to underneath. Extreme heat can lead to extreme discomfort when body armor is worn beneath clothing. The outer-carrier gives the officer the ability to remove the vest and "cool off" after a call for service is complete.

As police administration, it is our duty to provide our officers with the best equipment and training necessary to properly serve the public. The load-bearing vest has made an immediate and significant positive impact to officer wellness, morale, and service to the public. Our agency continues to look for new advancements in equipment and technology that will improve the day-to-day operations of the Watchung Police Department and personnel.

TRAFFIC & BEAUTIFICATION COMMITTEE



The Traffic and Beautification Committee members together with the DPW and the Garden Club of Watchung continue to work at beautifying Watchung Borough. Everyone is working diligently to restore its beauty after the devastation made by hurricane Ida.

The triangles are getting a fresh look and there are plans to restore plantings on Somerset Street and Spratford Park. Infrastructure repairs have been addressed so that improvements can continue to be made.

Everyone is invited to participate in our second Scarecrow Stroll around the Village Green this Fall. This was an exciting activity for individual families, scout troops and town organizations. Many pictures were taken in front of these amazing entries as people marveled at the creative ideas put forth by the various groups.



New Jersey American Water Launching Education Campaign to Encourage Customers to Identify & Report Their Service Line Material

Customer education effort will support company's Lead Service Line Replacement Program, replacing all lead and galvanized water service lines by 2031.

CAMDEN, N.J. – MAY 22, 2023 – New Jersey American Water is launching an education campaign across the company's service areas to encourage customers to self-identify and report the

material of the service line that brings water into their home. The educational effort is part of the company's Lead Service Line Replacement Program aimed at replacing all lead and galvanized water service lines by 2031 as mandated by state law.

"Replacing all lead and galvanized water service lines by 2031 is a top priority. The first step in accomplishing this goal, in the most efficient and cost-effective way, is to know where they are so we can remove them in a coordinated method, street-by-street and town-by-town," said Mark McDonough, President, New Jersey American Water. "By educating and empowering our customers to participate in this easy way, we can help accelerate the program more expeditiously than the law's 2031 deadline."

New Jersey American Water is asking their customers to help

support the effort by locating and identifying their water service line and submitting a survey with their findings. This can be done in three easy steps and using simple household items such as a magnet and a coin to identify the material of the water service line. The instructions on how to identify your line – including a video tutorial at www.youtube.com/watch?v=FHzIn7Bi24I – and a special portal to submit your findings can be found at www.njamwaterlsIr.com/inventory.

ENVIRONMENTAL COMMISSION

The Watchung Environmental Commission (EC) has been busy as always working to protect and preserve Watchung's natural beauty and resources. Below is an update on what the EC has been doing in 2023, as well as information you can use to help keep Watchung green!

Tree Removal Information

A permit is required to cut down any tree in Watchung, dead or alive. PERMITS ARE FREE and can be found on the Borough website or by calling the Engineering Office at 908-756-0091. Due to the huge loss of trees in Watchung, please consider replanting, even if it's not required. To help residents choose the best trees to plant in this area, the EC has created a PREFERRED TREE LIST of recommended NATIVE trees. The list can be found on the Borough website on the EC page under "Trees."

Special Recycling Reminders

There are a number of special recycling programs available to Watchung residents for items that Somerset County does not collect curbside. First, STYROFOAM can now be recycled Monday through Friday during business hours at the Dept. of Public Works (DPW), 880 Somerset St., just north of the Police Station. You can pull right up to the bin and drop your foam off. Only clean, white packing Styrofoam is accepted with all writing, tape, and labels removed. Also, there's a BOOK recycling bin up the driveway of the Firemen's Exempt Hall, 31 Mountain Blvd. It's available 24/7 for book drop-off. Books must have an ISBN barcode on the cover. Paperback, hardcover, and textbooks in good, readable condition are all acceptable. Books can also be donated to the Watchung Public Library. Regular HOUSEHOLD BATTERIES can be recycled at Staples, at the customer service desk.

Best Lake Riparian Project

On April 22, 2023, the EC and a host of community volunteers implemented the second phase of the East Branch of the Stony Brook (near the entrance to Best Lake) Riparian Restoration. This was a continuation of the stream buffer project that was completed in April 2022. Phase 2 of the project included: the removal of invasive Japanese Barberry; planting 75 live plant stakes; planting 10 tree

saplings; planting understory native perennials, such as Milkweed and Swamp Sunflower; adding a Blue Bird/Tree Swallow box; and replacing and installing deer protection. The objectives of the project are to continue to transition a 150' stretch of previously mowed stream bank to a healthy riparian zone full of native trees, shrubs, and perennials that will improve water quality, provide flood control, and improve bird and pollinator habitat. We are happy to report that Tree Swallows nested in the bird box soon after it was installed and we observed Tree Swallow fledglings in the box in June.

Save Watchung's Wildlife - Cut Trees in Fall, not Spring

Each spring when homeowners cut down or prune trees and bushes, they often accidentally displace baby birds. Did you know that dead trees provide ecological benefits? According to the Raptor Trust in Millington, "Dead trees provide an abundance of resources to a wide variety of wildlife. Many species of birds, mammals, reptiles, and amphibians depend on them for roosting, nesting, and egg-laying sites, as well as a food source from the insects inhabiting the dead wood." If it's safe to do so, please consider delaying tree cutting until after nesting season. If the dead tree is far away from your house or in an area where it poses no risk, consider leaving it there as habitat for wildlife.

Fishing Line Recycling

The EC has heard from residents with concerns about fishing line debris accumulating in and around our lakes. The EC shares these concerns, especially with regard to the potential impact this material may have on local wildlife. The EC has identified an innovative fishing line recycling program that would involve placing recycling receptacles at our lakes. The fishing line would then be collected and sent to a company that recycles it into new plastic products. At this point, the EC is seeking a partner, such as a scout group or similar organization to work with on the implementation of this program. PUBLIC WORKS

The 2023 Leaf Pickup will commence on October 30, 2023 and continue through December 15, 2023. All leaves must be in **BIODEGRADABLE PAPER BAGS** and placed on the grass area close to the road. **NO PLASTIC BAGS WILL BE ACCEPTED FOR PICKUP.** Pickups will not be scheduled for any specific time or location.

Leaf pickup

Leaf pickup is limited to high density areas located within the following areas: Brookdale, Stirling and Hillcrest Roads North to Evergreen Lane; Mountain Blvd from Washington Drive to Rock Ave.; Johnston Drive to the water tower including Upper Drive and Johnston Drive Extension.

All residents are urged to utilize their leaves as compost; however, should any resident in a rural area desire pickup of leaves in BIODEGRADABLE PAPER BAGS ONLY, call the office of Public Works at 908-756-0080, ext. 214. Due to the State's Stormwater

Regulations, the Borough has an ordinance prohibiting placement of leaves in the street.

Residents:

Please remember to comply with snow removable regulations. Snow removed from driveways or any other place shall not be placed on any public street or right-of-way!! § Chapter 17-3.3

§ Chapter 14-45.1

Snow and Ice Removal from Sidewalks and Driveways.

The owner or tenant of real property abutting, adjoining, or bordering any public street shall remove all snow and ice from the abutting, adjoining, or bordering sidewalk and driveway within the public right-of-way, of said public street, within 24 hours of the snow having fallen or the ice having formed thereon.

Any accounts delinquent as of December 2022, including Special Assessments will be included in our Tax Sale this fall.

Please note that if you use Bill Pay through your bank, it may take a week or more for the Tax Office to receive the payment. Even though your bank account shows the money being withdrawn on the date that you initiate the bill pay, the bank prints and mails a check to the Borough which delays the process. For this reason, we recommend using the payment process provided on our website or dropping a check off at Borough Hall. If you leave a payment in the drop box outside of the Tax Office, the payment will be credited to your account the next business day.

The Historical Committee invites all Watchung residents to visit the Watchung Texier House Museum in the center of the Watchung Circle. Join us every first and third Sundays of each month from 2pm to 4pm with additional openings for special holidays and events. Be sure to check the Borough website for announcements, availability, programming, and special guests! We will once again participate in Somerset County's Weekend Journey Through the Past October 7th and 8th and hope that you can join us during this weekend!

We are always working on new additions and improvements to the Texier House Museum. Recently, we have been working closely with Helena Ruta, Girl Scout Gold Award candidate who has been creating a new display on the Watchung Borough Schools at the Texier House Museum. Her project includes: a brand-new timeline with detailed descriptions and photos of all the schools in the Borough's history, a scavenger hunt that can be used while visiting the Museum, and a time capsule of student essays describing the life of a student in the Watchung Schools in 2023. This time capsule will be sealed for 25 years and reopened in 2048! She also interviewed several teachers and staff from the Watchung Borough Schools, and we hope to have these interviews added to our oral history collection in the future. We thank Helena for her hard work and dedication to this display. We also want to thank the members of our committee and the community who have supported her on this journey. We were happy to celebrate her achievements and updates to the school display in a special Open House event that occurred on September 10th.

The committee is always grateful for community donations. We would like to extend our appreciation to Tim Jones for his recent donation of ice cutting tools used at Watchung Lake. The Pennett Family donated a laundry mangle to the museum which will be added to the Home and Hearth Room. Saving the mural was a community effort, just as the reenactment of the Legend of Watchung was between the years of 1911 and 1936, and a final encore in 1964 in celebration of New Jersey's 300th Anniversary.

As we look around Watchung, we cannot help but notice that there are so many names and places tied to the characters, stories, and people who were part of the Legend of Watchung. It has always been part of the fabric of this wonderful Borough. The mural was painted years ago as a form of storytelling through visuals, before TV streaming platforms. While the Sears store in Watchung has come and gone, the mural is still unique and specific to Watchung and the surrounding area; it is a one of a kind. Some have argued that the mural was one of the most defining features of the store itself! We look forward to announcing the location of a new home for this impressive, original, and important piece of artwork soon!


