FROM YOUR MAYOR

Dear Residents of Watchung,

In March I visited the second grade classes at Bayberry School, to read to them and to answer their questions. It is always a fun event! These kids are smart, inquisitive, polite, and respectful, and they really want to know what it is like being mayor and what is going on in town. They are very candid and sincere in their thoughts and ideas.

As previously stated, your feedback and ideas are always welcome too! And in the last several months the Mayor and Council have received a great deal of commentary on many issues including affordable housing, deer management, the library, and suggestions on how to further improve the town's appearance. While the opinions often vary, the feedback is always well-received when constructively and respectfully given. While budget and time may restrict our ability to address every request, we take all your input seriously.

Your Borough government recently pursued the refinancing of a bond issued in 2007. Quickly responding to just recent refinancing eligibility, the town will save \$915K over the next ten years in interest payments. The town's credit rating also was recently upgraded by Standard and Poors to AA+ rating, another indicator of Watchung's strong financial position. Final touches are being put on the Borough's 2017 budget to be approved in April, which will be slightly under the State-mandated 2% levy cap. And the Borough continues to work towards a mutually beneficial new contract with our local PBA.

On the topic of affordable housing, a recent New Jersey Supreme Court ruling now recognizes what is called the "gap period" (1999-2015) which will result in the assessment of additional low and moderate income housing units to be built across New Jersey municipalities – this, in addition to what obligations already have been assigned. This puts an incredible burden on municipalities like Watchung, which are completely "built out". While some residents believe that Watchung has no obligation to proceed with any additional housing, failure to make efforts to comply provides grounds for legal recourse opportunities known as "builders' remedy", which could result in a multitude increase in the number of housing units legally forced upon Watchung to be built. This would fundamentally transform Watchung as it has other towns. Your Mayor and Council continue to fight for a better, balanced solution to this difficult challenge.

In response to residents' requests, an aerial survey was performed in February to better determine the number of deer in Watchung; the results of which are expected sometime in early April. With these results the Mayor and Council will decide what next steps are required to further manage the deer population.

The Council continues to look into options around a library facility that both meets the needs of the community and which is in line with the budget it would like to spend. Architect Arcari and Iovino had provided a 9,100 square foot facility design; the Council is now looking to potentially further scale back the building's size while still trying to maintain the requirements of what is important in building today's libraries and community centers.

Borough committees and volunteer groups (e.g., Open Space, Environmental) are choosing from several preliminary designs on how the Ness property (a 20+ acre property on the west end of town purchased by the Borough in 2007 for open space) might be used for recreational purposes. Efforts to remediate the property and remove unwanted buildings will resume this spring.

Also, we expect that construction of the 9/11 memorial will start in April. Road work on Valley Drive will commence with the end of winter. Plans are well under way for requests for bids on Washington Drive improvements with the hope to complete the project by the end of the summer as well as other road projects this summer once decisions are finalized on which road improvement projects to pursue.

I had the honor of attending the Watchung Troop #32 Eagle Scout dinner in February, celebrating two new Eagle Scouts Joshua Schmidt and Logan Stiles. Congratulations to both of them for this great achievement! Special congratulations also to Watchung residents WHRHS senior Daniel Lee (named one of the top 300 young U.S. scientists) and WHRHS junior Julia Cunningham (for breaking the school's all-time basketball scoring record) for their achievements.

Several reminders of upcoming events in town include the Community Picnic: May 20th, 12-3 pm (rain date May 21st); Memorial Day Observance: May 29th, 9:30 am; September 11th service (time to be determined); Gerald Mobus Memorial Fishing Derby: September 16th, 9:30-11:30 (rain date September 17th); and the Harvest Festival: October 28th, 2-5 PM (rain date October 29th).



ZIKA VIRUS DISEASE

This disease is spread to people primarily through the bite of an infected mosquito but can also be spread through sexual contact and from a pregnant woman to her fetus. The most common symptoms are fever, rash, joint pain, and conjunctivitis (red eyes). The illness is usually mild with symptoms lasting up to a week after being bitten by an infected mosquito.

This virus can cause a severe birth defect called microcephaly (abnormally small head) severe fetal brain defects, and other conditions such as Guillain-Barre Syndrome.

CDC RECOMMENDS SPECIAL PRECAUTIONS FOR PREGNANT WOMEN AND WOMEN TRYING TO BECOME PREGNANT

Pregnant women in any trimester should consider postponing travel to areas where Zika virus is spreading. Pregnant women who do travel to one of these areas should talk to their doctor first and strictly follow steps to avoid mosquito bites during the trip. Women whose partner has traveled to an area where Zika is present should abstain from sex, or correctly and consistently use condoms for all sex acts, throughout the remainder of the pregnancy. See your doctor if you are pregnant and have traveled, or plan to travel, to an area where Zika is present.

Finally, no local mosquito-borne Zika virus disease cases have been reported in New Jersey, but there have been <u>travel-associated</u> cases. Eliminating the presence of standing and stagnant water can go a long way to reducing the mosquito population and other mosquito-borne diseases such as West Nile Virus. Stagnant water can collect in many places around the home, such as bird baths, empty ceramic pots, discarded tires, buckets, clogged rain gutters, and plastic wading pools to name a few. Please take the following steps to prevent mosquito breeding:

Replace water in your birdbaths every couple of days.

Dispose of tin cans, plastic containers, ceramic pots and other water-holding containers that are outside. Clean and chlorinate swimming pools.

Turn over plastic wading pools, wheelbarrows, and buckets when not in use.

Aerate ornamental pools, or stock them with fish.

By using these simple control measures you can help reduce the population of mosquitoes around your home and will be more able to enjoy the spring and summer months.

I was recently asked by the Council to look into the possibility of designating a location as an internet sales exchange zone where people could feel safe while exchanging merchandise that they previously agreed to buy or sell on-line. After doing a bit of research with other communities that have already established similar programs, I am happy to report that Watchung Police Headquarters has been established as an Internet Exchange Safe Zone.

Whenever dealing with strangers and people who we only know through on-line communications, it is always better to meet in a public location. This commonsense approach should also be applied to exchanging merchandise after an on-line transaction has taken place. Meeting at police headquarters should act as a deterrent, but buyers and sellers should not be lulled into a false sense of security. While meeting strangers in public places is always a better option, anyone using police headquarters as an exchange location should not let their guard down. If you arrange to meet someone at police headquarters you should plan the meeting as if the police department will be unoccupied. Try to meet during daylight hours whenever possible. If the other party is hesitant to meet you at a police station, it might be wise to avoid doing business with them altogether. Don't go alone, and share your plans with others. Don't carry large sums of cash, and consider paying by check if an on-line payment option is not available. Also, remember to bring your cell phone and call 911 in case of an emergency.

Police officers may randomly enter or exit police headquarters during your merchandise exchange, but they will not supervise, monitor, or get involved in buyer—seller disputes over things like pricing, or the quality of the item being sold. This program simply offers a safe location to exchange merchandise. Hopefully, meeting at police headquarters will deter someone with bad intentions from causing any harm or engaging in dishonest business transactions. Just remember, taking steps to ensure that you do not become a victim begins with you!
