

Mayor's Message

As we are looking toward the end of summer, I am sure residents are as pleased as I am to see several projects moving along that have been "in the wings" for some time. On the down side is the inconvenience a project causes to a neighborhood. The Washington Rock Road/Rock Road East Intersection is a perfect example. I want to thank those residents whose properties have been affected. They have shown a great deal of patience during this project. Those of you who use the road on a regular basis have also shown great patience dealing with the condition of the road. I'm told the road will be open for the beginning of school.

A contract has been awarded to Tomaro Contracting of Rockaway to do drainage improvements and reconstruction on Anderson Road and this project should be starting the first week in September. Design plans for the Orchard/Cory/Sunbright/Eaton Road Sanitary Sewer and Water Project and are moving along and we will schedule an information meeting for the residents before the end of September.

Bids received on the sanitary sewer repair project for the Spencer Lane/Fawn Drive area came in higher than the engineer's estimates, so the project will have to be rebid. Field work has begun for drainage projects on Joan Drive and Ridge Road in the Crestwood Drive area.

People cannot drive along Valley Road and not see the "green" hue of Best Lake. An article in another part of this newsletter gives reasons for the Lake's poor condition, but it also relates that the Borough has issued a final design contract for the remediation, dredging and dam reconstruction to bring Best Lake back to good health.

We have reached an agreement with Estate trustees for purchase of the 20 acre "Ness Farm" and will finalize the agreement with the Jewish Federation of Central New Jersey. The plan is to create a great recreation area with several all purpose fields and trails. I will be putting together a task force that will develop a plan in a similar way we planned Watchung Lake.

The Library Advisory Committee has been meeting this summer and will be reporting to the Council their suggestions for the future of the facility. I am looking forward to their report. Please note that due to structural concerns the bridge to the Library and Seniors Room has been closed to both vehicular and pedestrian traffic.

I have received notice from the Somerset County Freeholders that, as part of their municipal out-reach program the boulevard improvements for Somerset Street from Veterans Memorial Park to Watchung Circle, approximately 0.6 miles, are being considered for their capital plan for 2006. We are sending in our comments and we will coordinate our plans for "Spratford Park" with the project.

Welcome to Dr. Pat Parenty on his return as interim School Superintendent for the Watchung Schools. I look forward to continued cooperation with him and the Watchung Board of Education. "Thanks" to our Borough staff and volunteers for their continued excellent service in the "wonderful Watchung spirit" that continues to make our community unique. Don't forget the September 11 Memorial Ceremony scheduled for 5:00 PM on that day.

Looking forward to seeing you at the MAYOR'S REGATTA ON September 25th.

FROM THE PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT

The 2005 Leaf Pickup will commence on November 1, 2005 and continue until December 2, 2005. All leaves **must be in <u>BIO-DEGRADABLE PAPER BAGS</u>** and placed on the grass area close to the road. **NO PLASTIC BAGS WILL BE ACCEPTED FOR PICKUP.** Pickups will not be scheduled for any specific time or location.

Leaf pickup is limited to high density areas located within the following areas: Brookdale, Stirling and Hillcrest Roads north to Evergreen Lane; Mountain Blvd from Washington Drive to Rock Ave.; Johnston Drive to the water tower including Upper Drive and Johnston Drive Extension. All residents are urged to utilize their leaves as compost; however, should any resident in a rural area desire pickup of leaves in BIODEGRADABLE PAPER BAGS ONLY, call the office of Public Works at 756-0080, ext.35. Due to the State's New Stormwater Regulations, the Borough now has an ordinance prohibiting placement of leaves in the street.

Old man Winter is just around the corner. The Public Works Department works hard to maintain public streets, thoroughfares and right-of-ways clear for safe passage of vehicular traffic during and following periods of snowfall.

Public Works would like to remind residents that the pushing/plowing of snow onto Borough roads is prohibited by ordinance. Please take the time to advise your contractors. Remember, the icing over of residual snow in the roadways creates unnecessary safety hazards and removal takes a severe toll on the Borough's equipment. Youth Services Commission

The Watchung Borough Council established a Youth Services Commission in December, 2003. It is funded by an annual grant from the Somerset County Board of Chosen Freeholders. Its purpose is to bring together community representatives in government, education, law enforcement, recreation and interested citizens to serve as a planning and enabling agency for the development and coordination of youth services in the Borough of Watchung.

This past year we were able to start a program called "Girls on the Run" at Bayberry School. Bayberry Teacher Necole Fabris coached the program and was assisted by Stephanie Blackadar, who volunteered to work with the program. "Girls on the Run" is an interactive running/life skills program which encourages emotional, social, mental, spiritual and physical health. The program meets twice a week for 10 weeks and culminates in the running of a 5K Race at Duke Island Park in June. We were also able to join with Green Brook and Warren to fund several programs at the High School level, including the Rainbow program for peer grief counseling and the Women's Assault Prevention Assembly for High School junior and senior girls.

OPEN SPACE AND RECREATION PLAN

The Borough has received a \$5,000 matching grant from the Association of New Jersey Environmental Commissions (ANJEC) to finance the preparation of an Open Space and Recreation Plan. Funded by the Geraldine R. Dodge Foundation, the Smart Growth Planning Grant Program is designed to help municipalities with the process of comprehensive planning to create livable and environmentally sustainable communities. The Borough's portion of the cost will include \$2,500 of direct funding along with provision of \$2,500 in employee and volunteer in-kind services.

The document will examine the Borough's needs and goals, as well as establish priorities and strategies for future preservation. With a comprehensive open space inventory and plan to serve as the basis for community-wide open space and recreation planning in the future, the plan is intended to serve as a guide, providing broad-based policies and concepts for achieving open space preservation goals using a variety of funding sources. The completed plan will be incorporated into the Watchung Master Plan, which will be updated by the Planning Board in the coming months. This OSR Plan will also be submitted to the State of New Jersey Dept. of Environmental Protection for approval; having an approved plan will enable the Borough to apply for maximum funding from Green Acres for any future open space purchases.

The Borough appointed a 7-member project team, including representatives from the Environmental Commission, Planning Board, Recreation Commission, Open Space Committee, Borough Council, Engineering Dept. and the Administrator, who will work with Heyer, Gruel and Associates, who have been hired to work on the preparation of the plan. A public meeting will be held later in the year to review and secure input on the draft before it is finalized.

BEST LAKE UPDATE

Watchung residents have surely noticed the greenish hue taken on by the waters of Best Lake. Borough Officials are quite aware of the problem at Best Lake and are working toward a solution. The problem is algae growth and exists due to a shallow depth situation and lack of aeration in the Lake. In order to improve the quality of Best Lake it must be dredged, removing the silt that has settled on the bottom of the lake over the past several years. Dredging is part of the overall Best Lake Dam Rehabilitation Project. The project has just begun its Final Design stage after recently receiving approval from the Department of Environmental Protection Bureau of Dam Safety and Flood Control. The Bureau approved the Class III, lowhazard classification and the 100-year storm for the spillway design storm as recommended in the Hazard Classification Study submitted by Civil Dynamics, a consultant to the Borough. During the next several months the Borough will work with Civil Dynamics to design Best Lake Dam Rehabilitation Project, which includes dredging and reconstruction of the dam and spillway. Once final design is completed and the project construction has been funded, the permit applications will be submitted to the Bureau for approval. After receiving the permits the project will go out to bid, construction can begin and residents can look forward to a clean and improved Best Lake once again.

Planning to Sell your home?

All private wells must be tested by a certified lab and septic systems must be inspected and certified by an engineer or other qualified inspector. All certifications must be submitted to the Health Department for approval. You may obtain applications for these permits at the Watchung Municipal Building, 15 Mountain Blvd., Watchung, NJ 07069.

All homes, under Law, must have a smoke and carbon monoxide detector inspection prior to closing. Please give yourself adequate lead time for these required inspections. Please call 908-756-0080, ext. 35 to schedule an inspection.

FIRE DEPT.

During the first half of 2005, the Watchung Volunteer Fire Department responded to 139 calls and held 14 training drills totaling of 1300 man-hours.

Fire Prevention Week is October 9th to the 15th. This year's theme is "Use Candles with Care, When you go out, Blow Out!" Over the last decade, candle fires have tripled to over 18,000 a year.

Some tips for safe candle use are:

- 1) Use sturdy candle holders that won't tip or burn.
- 2) Use candles on sturdy uncluttered surfaces.
- 3) Keep lit candles at least 1 foot away from curtains, mattresses, and other combustibles.
- 4) Trim candle wicks to one-quarter inch before lighting.
- 5) When lighting candles, keep your hair and clothing away from the flame.
- 6) Extinguish candles when they burn to within two inches of their holder.
- 7) Never allow children to use candles in their bedrooms.
- 8) Avoid using candles during power outages. Have flashlights, batteries and battery-powered lights on hand for emergency lighting.

The Watchung Fire Department and the Bureau of Fire Prevention will be holding assemblies at the local schools during Fire Prevention Week. School art classes will also participate in the annual poster contests. There will be an Open House at the Firehouse at 57 Mountain Blvd., on Sunday, October 16th at 12:00 noon.

Fall and winter safety tips:

- 1) Have fireplace and wood burning stove chimneys cleaned regularly.
- 2) Use space heaters with adequate ventilation. Store the fuel safely and clean up all spills before starting the heater.
- 3) Holiday lights—Use proper number of extension cords, do not use cords that are frayed, never run cords under carpeting or where they can become worn and shorted out, and do not overload electrical sockets.
- 4) Never start your car in an enclosed garage. This will lead to carbon monoxide poisoning and could be fatal.











Fire Safety in the Home



Things you can do to prevent fires in your home and help you get out safely if you do have a fire:

- 1) Perform a home safety inspection. Examine every room of your house. Check all electrical cords for loose, frayed wires, make sure combustibles are far enough away from heat sources, gasoline and flammable liquids are stored properly in metal cabinets, clean up leaks and dispose of the rags properly.
- 2) Check smoke detectors regularly.
- 3) Have at least 1 fire extinguisher on each floor of your home.
- 4) Plan and practice **EDITH** (Exit Drills in the Home). Make an escape plan of your house with 2 ways out of each room. Have a common meeting place outside. Hold practice drills so everyone knows what to do in case of emergency.

Help us find you in case of an emergency. House numbers should be clearly visible to all emergency services. Numbers should be a minimum of 3" and reflective. It is recommended that these markings be on a mailbox or lawn marker at the street. Valuable time can be lost trying to determine the correct address for our response.

Remember on October 29th, when you change your clocks, change your smoke and carbon monoxide detector batteries. Detectors of each type should be properly installed on each level of your home for your safety. Test your detectors at least once a month.



HYDRANTS



Being able to quickly find a hydrant can save precious time in an emergency. If you have a hydrant on or near your property - clear snow from around them in the winter and in the summer keep grass and weeds trimmed. PLEASE ADOPT A HYDRANT AND HELP OUT!

The Watchung Volunteer Fire Department is always in need of new members. Any person, 16 years of age or older with a desire to serve their community, can join. The department has many responsibilities to perform, from firefighters to drivers and pump operators. Training is provided at no cost to you. Dog Licenses

Dog licenses are due during the month of <u>January</u>. The most efficient method is to mail your license request to Borough Hall. Simply enclose a copy of the updated rabies certificate (<u>the State Board of Health requires that the vaccination against rabies be valid through December of the license year</u>) with your check for payment, and a stamped, self-addressed envelope. Using this method will alleviate the inconvenience of waiting at Borough Hall. Licenses can also be purchased in person Monday through Friday from 8:00 A.M. to 4:00 P.M.

All original documentation will be mailed to you with the license and tag. A license cannot be issued without proof of a current vaccination. All dogs seven months of age or older must be licensed. VOLCANOES KILLING TREES IN WATCHUNG

Mulching has recently introduced volcanoes to many lawns in our community.

Proper mulching and especially in new plantings is an accepted and recommended practice that will enhance the soil conditions for optimum root growth. This can be the difference between success and failure of the tree or shrub.

Starting approximately 6" from the trunk spreading outward to at least the dripline of the tree, apply mulch to a maximum depth of 2"-4". For extra weed avoidance, a woven landscape fabric can be put under the mulch. Never pile mulch up against the trunk as this can cause decline and death of the tree in several ways. Mulch materials by their very nature retain moisture, which is good except where it prevents the exchange of gasses at the trunk. The above ground trunk tissues are different from the roots and will be damaged by excess moisture, eventually disrupting the natural uptake of water and nutrients from the roots, resulting in a stressed plant subject to any number of disease or insect problems.

Mulching over the recommended 2'-4" maximum depth can also reduce the gas exchange in the root zone, harbor rodents that feed on roots or stems, increase soil moisture to harmful levels, and even kill by increasing soil temperatures during the mulch's decomposing process. Tree roots that may grow up into the cone of mulch on top of the soil cannot be healthy.

It is hard to convince homeowners of the dangers of improper mulching because it takes years for damage from the volcanoes to appear. By the time the tree starts to appear distressed, considerable growth time and mulch expense has been wasted.

If your plants are currently growing in a volcano type of situation and have been for several seasons, be very careful in trying to remedy the problem. Complete and rapid removal of excess mulch can do damage. Start by carefully, and with hand tools, removing some of the mulch away from the trunk and work your way outwards, being careful of damaging either the trunk or roots. It can be completed, again with care, at a later date.

Remember that volcanoes are **bad** and donuts are **good**.



A campaign encouraging people to enter an emergency contact number in their mobile phone's memory under the heading **ICE** (In Case of Emergency), has rapidly spread throughout the world as a particular consequence of last week's terrorist attacks in London.

Originally established as a nation-wide campaign in the UK, **ICE** allows paramedics or police to be able to contact a designated relative/next-of-kin in an emergency situation.

The idea is the brainchild of East Anglian Ambulance Service paramedic Bob Brotchie and was launched in May this year. Bob, 41, who has been a paramedic for 13 years said: "I was reflecting on some of the calls I've attended at the roadside where I had to look through the mobile phone contacts struggling for information on a shocked or injured person. Almost everyone carries a mobile phone now, and with ICE we'd know immediately who to contact and what number to ring. The person may even know of their medical history."

By adopting the **ICE** advice, your mobile will help the rescue services quickly contact a friend or relative – which could be vital in a life or death situation. It only takes a few seconds to do and it could easily help save your life. Why not put **ICE** in your phone now? Simply select a new contact in your phone book, enter the word 'ICE' and the number of the person you wish to be contacted.

Women's Health Screenings

Routine health screenings are vital to your health and everyone is encouraged to be screened. In order to help facilitate this for those who may not be financially able to afford routine medical care, the Middle-Brook Regional Health Commission has entered into an agreement with the Women's Health and Counseling Center, located in Somerville, to provide low cost annual women's health screenings. This program will provide the following services:

Annual gynecological screening visit including:

- Medical History
- Physical
- Breast & Cervical Cancer Screening

The cost of these services will be \$135.00. If followup is needed, the Women's Health & Counseling Center will work with the patient to assure a continuum of care, based on the patient's needs and financial status.

Watchung Traffic & Beautification Update

Thanks to the dedicated work of our committee and the wonderful help of Public Works Supervisor Charlie Gunther and his men, our town is looking very, very good.

2005 was "kicked" off with Operation Pride on April 23rd. This is our town-wide clean up in partnership with the Clean Communities Program. This year the Scouts and their leaders were a great help and did a super job. The Clean Communities Grant that Watchung receives makes it possible to have Tom Locke patrol our streets and pick up litter. He is a big help to us and does a fabulous job.

On Arbor Day we planted a lovely tree next to the Mountain Blvd. Gazebo. This is an annual event that we do with the Junior Garden Club and Tamke Tree experts and is a wonderful joint effort. In May we did our annual planting around the circle. T&B has two triangles —one near Boro Hall and one on Somerset Street — and the Garden Club has one on Stirling Road.

Every year we coordinate our schedules and do all three triangles on the same day so that the spaces all look the same and really brighten up the circle.

We are working very hard on our big project which is Spratford Park on Somerset Street. It will be in the area that was cleared next to the Getty Station. The purpose of this space is to give us a defined entrance to Watchung. A stone wall will be built with the name Watchung on the front. The area will also be landscaped with trees and bushes. Plans are in the works and we hope we will be able to start construction quite soon.

If there are any areas that you as townspeople would like to see improved, please call Boro Hall and leave a message for the T&B committee.

The Borough appeals to its citizens to aid in its Deer Management Program. To enhance the success of the program, the Borough is in need of additional culling sites, especially in the east side of town between the Watchung Circle and Plainfield Ave/Bonnie Burn Road. To be considered, a shotgun culling site must have a tree capable of holding a tree stand elevated to a height of 20 to 30 feet, along with a nearby tree to hold an automatic baiting feeder. All shooting is done at a sharp downward angle and in a direction away from a dwelling. Shooting is done by professional sharpshooters and is safe; in its ten-year experience, the contractor retained by the Borough has never had a claim against it for any culling incident. Shotgun culling requires the permission of all property owners whose dwellings are within 450' of the culling site. The Borough has, up to this point, maintained a preference for shotgun culling over "netting and euthanasia," but may need to consider moving to that option if sufficient shotgun culling sites are not obtained.

A net site requires a 60' x 60' clear-cut square, preferably in a side yard or back yard. Netting followed by

euthanasia does not require permission from any property owners other than the one who hosts the site, since culling by this method does not involve flying projectiles such as slugs or arrows. Any citizen of the Borough who would like to volunteer to host a shotgun or netting site, or who would grant permission for a shotgun site within 450' of his or her dwelling, should contact the Borough Administrator at 908-756-0080.

The Borough's actions in the Deer Management program represent the wishes of the majority of the Borough's citizens; however, success depends on the cooperation of property owners in the Borough. Please help your town gain control by placing a call now.
